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#### AN INTERVIEW WITH THE AUTHOR

Although Samuel Pepys should be intimately known to all English speaking people, there is no doubt that like many other books his Diary is better known by hearsay than by actual acquaintance. Asking my friend Mr. Fagan on what he had based his play he began telling me its history, and I give it in his own words.

"So many people have asked me how much of my play "AND SO TO BED" has been transplanted from Samuel Pepys immortal Diary that I should like to enlighten them. For many years I have been fascinated by the idea of putting Pepys on the stage in a full length play. But when I sat down to the task and re-read my Pepys I came to the conclusion that any attempt to dramatise the Diary or part of it would probably result in a scrappy type of chronicle play, which would fail to give a living portrait of the diarist.

So I began where the Diary ended and placed my play in June, 1669, a few days after the last entry.

There is no historical foundation for the happenings in "AND SO TO BED" but there is a seed in the pages of the Diary from which they might have grown and did grow in my imagination.

Pepy's entry dated September 1667 "After dinner I to the office and they gone anon, comes Pelling and he and I to Gray's Inn Fields thinking to have heard Mrs. Knight sing at her lodgings by a friend's means of his but we come too late so must try another time".

Again on September 4th, 1668 Pepys writes "this night Knepp tells us that there is a Spanish woman lately come over, that pretends to sing as well as Mrs. Knight, both of which I must endeavour to hear. So after supper to bed".

There is no record that he achieved his desire before the closing entry of May, 31st 1669, and this was my opportunity.

I think I may claim that I have drawn Pepys's portrait faithfully from his own revelations and there is nothing he says or does in the comedy that could not be parallelled in his pages.

But apart from about forty lines where, to use his own words and a few minor characteristic incidents in the early part of the play it is all imaginary.

To those who may object that I have not shown them the grave, sober Pepys the Secretary of State the father of the British Admiralty, I can only say that all that belongs to a later chapter and that I happened to catch him as the humourous rogue that evening that was all comedy and that if I have set down naught in Malice.

"I wonder would he have forgiven me?"

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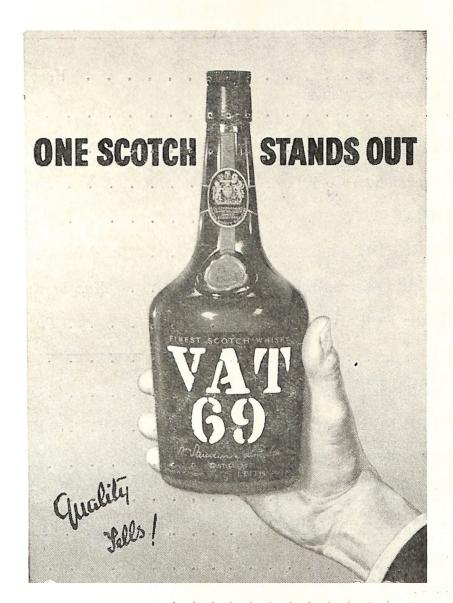

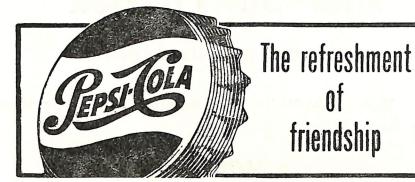

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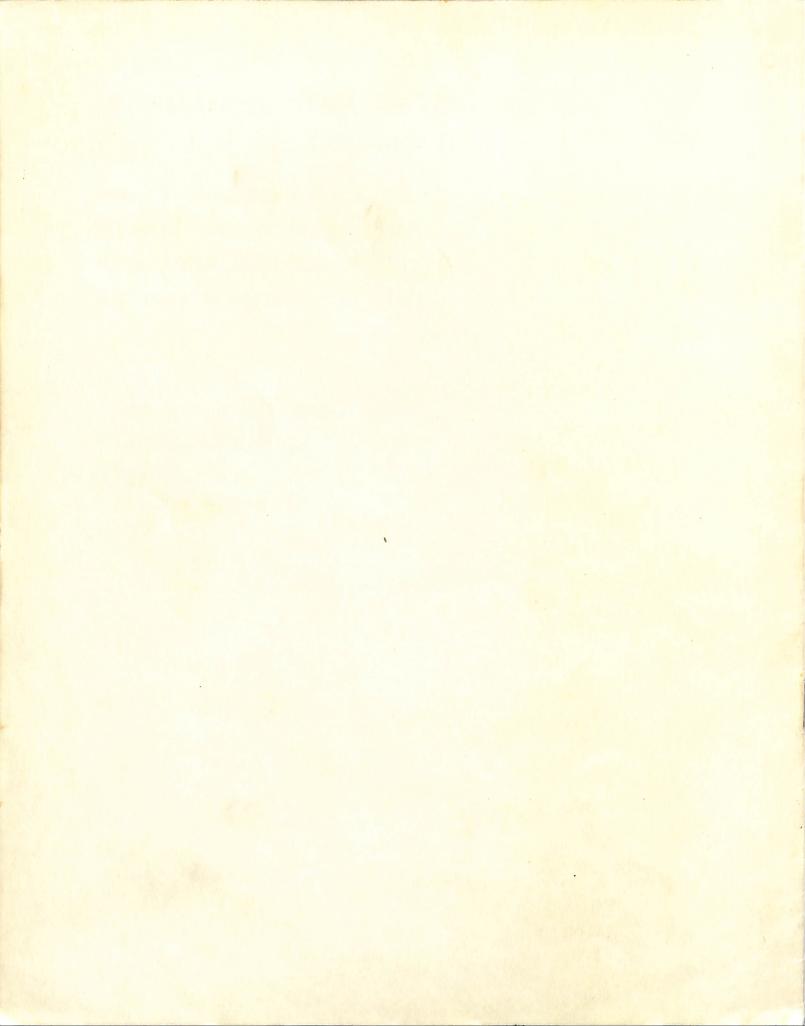
