Suppè, Franz — Germanised form of name used by Francesco Ermenegildo Ezechiele Suppè — Demelli. Austrian (Dalmation-born) composer of Belgian descent. Wrote a succession of popular operettas including "The Beautiful Galatea" and "Light Cavalry", overtures to plays including "Poet and Peasant", etc.

NOCTURNE FROM MASQUERADE SUITE

KHACHATURIAN (1903-

Aram Khachaturian was born in 1903 in Russia. This Armenian composer was a pupil of Gnessin and Miaskovsky. His works, often influenced by Armenian folk music, include piano concertos, violin concertos, cello concertos, two symphonies, ballets "Gayaneh", "Spartacus" and music to Sermontov's play "Masquerade". In Russia his "Song of Stalin" (1937) won him popularity and he has apparently found little difficulty in writing the music expected of him by his political masters.

CONCERT VERSION — MADAME BUTTERFLY

PUCCINI (1858-1924)

Puccini, Italian composer, was a pupil of Bazzini and Ponchielli and in his youth was a church musician. His work is almost entirely operatic written in this order: "Manon Lescaut", "La Boheme", "Tosca", Madame Butterfly", "The Girl of the Golden West", Triptych: "The Cloak", "Sister Angelica", "Gianni Schicchi", intended to form a single bill; and "Turandot" (1924, unfinished). He became one of history's most successful opera composers through a gift of 'strong' melody wedded to forceful dramatic plots, and was also original harmonist and orchestrator.

First performed: Moscow, in 1877.

In 1875, the directors of the Moscow Opera commissioned Tchaikowsky to write his first ballet. Thus, the master was brought to a field of composition in which he was to prove eminently successful, and be thus the forerunner of that magistral line of great Russian composers of Ballet music extending to Stravinsky and Prokofiev. The Swan Lake was presented at the Bolshoy Theatre on March 4, 1877 (Coreography by Julius Reisinger). It was unsuccessful and soon withdrawn. Tchaikowsky planned to revise his score, but death intervened. As a memorial to the great composer, the second act of the ballet, revised, was performed at the St. Petersburg Maryinsky Theatre — the choreography, this time, planned by Marius Petipa (in collaboration with Ivanov). One year later, the complete ballet was revived at the same theatre and with the same choreographers; this time it scored a success.

WALTZ ESTUDIANTINA WALDTEUFEL (1837-1915)

This French composer, very popular waltz composer was a pianist and chamber muscician to Empress Engenie and Director of court balls.

LOEWE

Loewe, who is an American composer, has written light music. He has composed background music for many well known films.
