DIOCESE OF SOUTHWARK.

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My DEAR LORD,

I have the honour of laying before you the General Report of the Schools of the Diocese for the year 1878. The particular Report of each individual School has been already submitted to your Lordship, and has been forwarded, with your signature and approval, to the respective Managers. These particular Reports have thus received the impress of your Lordship's approbation and authority, and to them, doubtless, due weight will be attached by both Managers and Teachers. The Inspector has therein stated, in detail, his appreciation of the School, has pointed out the defects to be remedied, has given praise where it was deserved, and admonition where it was needed.

It is necessary to insist the more upon these particular Reports this year, because by the decision of your Lordship and the English Hierarchy generally, they are for the present to be omitted from the General Report.

The Examination of the Schools has been conducted by Canon Wenham, Fr. Murnane of Mortlake, and myself. In consequence of the ill health of Canon Wenham, the greater part of the work has fallen upon me. Canon Wenham was however able to give material assistance in the spring quarter of the year, and I have received willing and efficient aid from Fr. Murnane.

Higher Schools.—The actual number on the books in these Schools is 1440 or 202 less than last year. This falling off is, however, more apparent than real, as two Schools in Jersey that last year were placed in this category, are now considered to be Elementary Schools, and are so classed. Moreover, the Convent at Roehampton this year was not examined. Thirty-four Higher Schools were actually examined, amongst them was the new Convent School at Tunbridge Wells. A very high standard of religious knowledge is reached in nearly every one of them. The following Higher Schools, from various causes, have not been examined—Roehampton Convent, Walmer Convent, Woburn College, and Miss Steven's School for Little Boys at Hastings,—this latter will be ready for inspection next year.

Elementary Schools.—There is practically no change in the number of these Schools since last year, for now we have 145 against 144. St. Joseph's School at Bermondsey, and the Boys' School at Peckham, have been closed, but the children of St. Joseph's have been absorbed into the other schools, and another Elementary Mixed School, and a new Infants' School have been established in the place of the Peckham Boys' School. The small Schools at Tenterden, Roehampton, Epsom, and Christchurch remain closed, although it is hoped that they will spring sometime or other into renewed and stronger life. A small School has been opened at Eltham which will

New Buildings.—A new Schoolroom has been erected at Peckham, as already stated, an excellent School has replaced the old one in Tooley Street, and additions or improvements have been made at Richmond, Bermondsey

Convent, Winchester, and Melior Street.

Number of Scholars.—There has been a marked increase in the number of children on the books, in the average attendance, and in the number actually examined. This year there are 12,994 on the books, an increase

of 616; there is an average attendance of 9,640, an increase of 683; and we actually examined 10,581 or 277 above the number examined and present last year. These last numbers are very encouraging and are of especial importance. Last year we put down the numbers of all who were present at the examination, whether they were examined or not; this year we have only taken the number of those actually examined, and we find an increase of 277. We point out this fact as very encouraging and important, because it shows unmistakeably that religious instruction is now reaching a greater number than ever before in the Diocese.

Uniting together all the Schools of the Diocese higher and lower that have been inspected, we see that there are 14,434 children on the books, an increase of 337, an average attendance of 10,936, an increase of 260.

Pupil Teachers.—There are 96 Pupil Teachers in the Diocese, 7 less than last year. The Class List is printed herewith, and all those who have passed in the first class, whatever may be their year, are entitled to a prize, given by the Poor-School Committee. This prize is a book, chosen by the Inspector, amongst those that will be of use to the Pupil Teachers in the remaining years of their course or in their future work. Our Pupil Teachers in the Examination have fairly held their own; there is no distinguishing success in the competition with the other Dioceses, nor, on the other hand, is there any humiliating failure.

Training Colleges.—The Examination for the three Training Colleges of England has again this year been the same in every point for each one. The Liverpool Students undoubtedly maintain their last year's pre-eminence, but they will soon have to look to their laurels, for if they have done exceedingly well, the Wandsworth and Hammersmith Students have done well, and there is clear evidence that these latter will not be content till they have reached as high a standard, and achieved as successful a result

as their more fortunate rivals.

Boys' Schools.—There are the same number of Boys' Schools as last year, and one of the best amongst them is Woolwich, to which is given the

Poor-School Committee prize of five pounds.

Girls' Schools.—There is also the same number of Girls' Schools—23—and to two of these as being the best among those who have not yet had the Poor-School Committee prize, it is this year given to Brent's Court and to Battersea.

Infants' Schools.—There are 29 Infant Schools, and amongst a number that have obtained very high marks we award the five pound prize to Port-

sea as being the best.

Mixed Schools.—Seventy of the Schools of the Diocese are mixed. Several of the best among them have already had the five pounds; the only one that has attained a sufficiently high mark, and that has not yet

had the prize is St. Joseph's, Paradise Street, Bermondsey.

Industrial Schools and Orphanages.—Of these there are still six in the Diocese, for although the Sacred Heart Nuns of Roehampton have closed their Orphanage, yet the Sisters of Notre Dame de Sion at Worthing have opened one. Two of the Orphanages, Mark Cross and Norwood, carry off the Poor-School Committee prize.

General Remarks.—There are thus 151 Elementary Schools in the Diocese. Of these 14 obtained the mark excellent, the highest that we give; 24 were classed as very good, 38 as good, 42 as very fair, 14 as fair,

15 as unsatisfactory, and 4 as bad.

This result is very encouraging, for it demonstrates that throughout

the Diocese, Religion is efficiently and successfully taught. It is evident that steady and satisfactory progress is being made in almost every mission in which there is a School. There are now comparatively few Schools in which Religion is kept in the background, and sacrificed to Secular instruction; in which Catechism is given at an hour, when it cannot and does not reach all the children; in which a large grant is everything, and Faith and Moral teaching little or nothing. There would be every reason to hope that in a short time there would not be one such School in the Dioceses, if only those who have charge of Schools would remember, first of all, that Religion is a science, acquired nowadays by teaching, and not by inspiration; secondly, that the very end of the existence of their Schools is the attainment of this science, and that therefore, thirdly, it is clearly indefensible that Religion should be taught in spare moments, when the School is in disorder through the children's coming in or going out, when, in a word, no attempt even would be made to teach arithmetic or any similar subject. On the last page of the Report is printed a new "Minute," which may meet what has been a difficulty and may greatly facilitate Religious Teaching.

Conclusion.—This Report is short and advisedly meagre; for your Lordship has kindly promised to take into consideration my representation that the burden of Inspection is greater than I can well bear. There is very much that attracts and interests me in its duties, and I am deeply convinced of its immense importance, but I live at some little distance from London, I have an extensive mission although small in numbers, and further I confess that the toil, drudgery, constant repetition of the same thing, and downright hard labour of Inspection demand a life of continual sacrifice to

which obedience only will make me longer submit.

Now that Canon Wenham is able to resume the direction of the duties of Inspection, he will find without difficulty, some other younger co-operator, who will render him more efficient, although not more willing, assistance. At the same time in this, as, I hope, in every other matter, I am utterly

in the hands of your Lordship.

It must be a subject of sincerest congratulation to your Lordship, and to the whole Diocese, that Canon Wenham is able to resume the direction of this work. For close upon a quarter of a century he has been Diocesan Inspector, and to his zeal, discretion and firmness is due, under your Lordship and your predecessor, the present satisfactory state of Religious Education in the Diocese.

It has been a great privilege to me to be allowed to work with and under him, and I am glad to be able to express publicly my gratitude for

his unceasing kindness and patient forbearance.

It would be ungrateful of me not to say a word of heartfelt thanks to my fellow Priests, throughout the Diocese, for their undeserved kindness. In my relations with them in the delicate and disagreeable duties of my office, I have met with nothing but courtesy and generous hospitality.

COURSE OF RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION FOR UPPER SCHOOLS.

- This Course is not put forward as of obligation, but in compliance with the request often made to be furnished with a definite scheme and such as is followed in the best Schools.
- I. Class (lowest).—Catechism, to end of Articles, with explanation of the words of the Catechism and of the Articles connected with the Life of Our Lord and with the Mysteries of the Rosary.

New Testament—Infancy of Our Lord.

Repetition—Acts of Faith, Hope, and Charity, and Contrition, and a few English Hymns.

II. Class.—Catechism, to end of Commandments of the Church, with simple explanation of the Commandments.

Old Testament, to the Giving of the Commandments (inclusive).

Repetition—"O Salutaris," "Tantum Ergo," "Litany of B.V.M.," and English Hymns.

III. Class.—Catechism, to the end, with simple explanation. New Testament—The Miracles and Passion of Our Lord. Repetition—"De Profundis," "Veni Creator," "Te Deum."

Intermediate Class for Foreigners or Pupils, who, for some reason, require separate and special instruction in the principal subjects of the foregoing Classes, before entering on the higher Course that follows.

IV. Class.—Charity, including the fullest explanation of Commandments of God and the Church.

New Testament-All Gospel History (including Parables] and Prophecies relating thereto.

V. Class.—Faith, including a complete explanation of the Creed. Old Testament, to the end of Kings, including Types.

VI. Class.—Hope, including means of Grace—Prayer, Sacraments, Festivals and Devotions.

Old Testament, to the end.

Extra Subjects—Acts of Apostles—Church History.

In some Schools it is thought best to take the Doctrine Subjects of the 4th and 5th Classes in reverse order.

It is not necessary to have all the Seven Classes going on at once, provided the Pupils go on year by year in the order of the Course, and keep up the knowledge of the previous years as they do in Secular Subjects.

CLASS BOOKS.

The "Manual of Instructions in Christian Doctrine," "Readings from the Old Testament" and "New Testament Narrative" are to be class books; and Fander's Catechism is very strongly recommended.

- N.B.—1. These Class Books specify and limit the points of Instruction to be attained; and no question will be asked at examination, a pass answer to which may not be found in them.
- 2. It is not intended to make the use of them obligatory, or to exclude the use of others which may be preferred, so long as the requisite knowledge be secured.
- 3. The deeper the knowledge of any subject, the higher will be the marks of merit awarded at examination.

EXAMINATIONS.

- 1. The "School Year," as regards Religious Examinations, will end in July. In the "School Year" 1878—1879 two Examinations will be held:—
 - 1. Saturday, 12 October, 1878.
 - 2. Saturday, 22 March, 1879.
- 2. The Fifth Year's work will be required of those Pupil Teachers who are qualified to go up for the Queen's Scholarships in the July following the Religious Examinations; the Fourth Years work in the preceding year and so on. Thus, the Queen's Scholars of 1879 will be examined in the Fifth Year on the 12th of October, 1878, or the 22nd of March, 1879.
- 3. Pupil Teachers of the Fourth and Fifth Years will have to give viva voce lessons to a class. The marks assigned for these lessons will be added to the marks obtained by the written examinations.

CATHOLIC POOR-SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

REWARDS TO TEACHERS AND PUPIL TEACHERS.

The Committee make Grants of Honour of £5 to Teachers of both sexes, selected in the proportion of 1 to 20 by the ecclesiastical Inspectors in the Schools examined by them.

Also a Grant of the average value of 7s. 6d. in books to Pupil Teachers of each year, who obtain a first-class in the Religious Examination.

Also a silver medal to Pupil Teachers at the end of their Pupil Teachership, who obtain a first-class in the Religious Examination.

The preceding Grants are common to both sexes, but the Committee makes the following Grants to male Teachers and Pupil Teachers only:—

- 1. The sum of £3 to each Pupil Teacher of the first, second, or third year; the sum of £4 to each Pupil Teacher of the fourth year; and the sum of £5 to each Pupil Teacher of the fifth year, who satisfies "Well" the requirements of Article 70 (e), Code of 1876, Art 19 E., the further condition being in each case that the Pupil Teacher obtains a first-class in the Religious Examination.
 - 2. A Grant of £2 to each Teacher of the aforesaid.

To Students entering Hammersmith the Committee engages to refund to them, in the course of their two years' training, the entrance fee of £5 paid by them, and further it makes,

- 3. A Grant of £10 to every Pupil Teacher who enters with a first-class in both the Secular and the Religious Examination.
- 4. A Grant of £10 to each Student of the first year, who obtains the double first-class at the end of the first year's examination.
- 5. A Grant of £5 to every Pupil Teacher who enters with a first-class in the one and a second-class in the other examination.
- 6. A Grant of £5 to each Student of the first year who obtains the first-class in the one and the second-class in the other examination at the end of the first year.
- 7. To those who may fail to obtain No. 3, 4, 5, or 6, a Grant of £4 10s. per annum for every Pupil Teacher who enters with a first-class in the Secular Examination, and a Grant of £2 per annum for every Pupil Teacher who enters with a second-class in the Secular Examination.
- 8. A Grant of mileage at the rate of 1d. a mile to candidates coming up to the July Examination at Hammersmith, and returning from it.
- 9. A Grant of £10 to the Master instructing a Pupil Teacher who enters the Training College with a first-class in the Secular Examination.
- 10. A Grant of £5 to the Master instructing a Pupil Teacher who enters the Training College with a second-class in the Secular Examination.
- 11. A Grant of £10 to any Pupil Teacher candidate who stands in the first ten on the General List.

NEW MINUTE MODIFYING THAT OF FEB. 7, 1871.

- "1. That the Time Table of each Public Elementary School shall be submitted to the Inspector of the district at every visit he pays to the School.
- "3. That the Inspector may approve any Time Table which, while conforming to section 7 (2) of the Elementary Education Act, 1870, in respect of the time or times appointed for Religious observances or instruction, sets apart at each meeting of a School, for the instruction in secular subjects of each class or division of the School, at least the amount of time prescribed by article 23 of the Code.
- "3 (a). Provided that at each meeting of a School instruction in secular subjects is continuously given for the prescribed time, by or under the personal supervision of the principal teacher, and that there is a class-room attached to the School; a Time Table may be approved which provides for Religious Instruction (in accordance with the provisions of section 7, and in Board Schools of section 14 (2), of the act of 1870), being given in the class-room to separate classes or divisions of the School, either at the beginning or end of the meeting; and the time of Secular Instruction need not be the same for the whole School.
- "3 (b). If there is no class-room attached to a School, the time for Secular Instruction must be the same for the whole School."
