# POST HASTE (17)

# (E) 20th century

The amount of postoffices reached a peak in 1901: 76945! Due to improved sorting and delivery, a long decline to a halving then began.

Coil stamps (in rolls of hundreds) were made available from 1908 to facilitate stamping of bulk mail. In 1911 uniform procedures were introduced for pre-cancels: stamps officially cancelled with the name of the issuing office (almost invariably between bars) before sale.

Although conventions began being signed almost thirty years earlier, the domestic transport of parcels was not taken out of the hands of private carriers until 1913.

The first experimental airmail flight between US cities took place in 1912, between New Orleans and Baton Rouge. 1918 saw the first airmail stamps - and the first regular internal service (serving New York, Philadelphia and Washington).

Regular transatlantic mail from New York to Bermuda and Lisbon became available from 1939.

A regular transpacific clipper service (connecting San Francisco with places like Hawaii and Manila) began in 1935, extended substantially in the next few years.

Two final interesting facts: in 1900 dog sleds were in use on routes in Alaska and United Nations stamps appeared in 1951, thus before the opening of the UNO HQ on New York's East River.

#### **MALTA OVERSEAS**

We again return to the Vatican, which of course included Malta in the 2011 annual set commemorating the Pope's voyages. As we well know, Benedict XVI visited us in April 2010. Giorgio

Borghesani featured Portugal, Cyprus, the United Kingdom and Spain respectively on the other four values in the set - issued on 18 November, and printed by Ireland's BDT.

The design structure is quite simple: His Holiness is shown against a background which can be termed symbolic of the particular visit. In fact we can see Floriana's parish church, near which he celebrated the main Mass (and where he actually put on the sacred vestements for it). The town is so named after Italian engineer Pietro Floriani who was brought

o ver by Grandmaster De Paule to design new defensive fortifications.

This church's first stone was laid by Bishop Alpheran de Bussan (in the presence of



Grand Master Manoel de Vilhena) in 1733. Construction was concluded in 1768 and the church began hosting a relic of St Publius (to whom it is dedicated). The dome was added in 1780 and Bishop Vincenzo Labini consecrated the church in 1792; however further additions ensued.

The town of Floriana became a parish in 1844, following Pope Gregory XVI's approval a few months earlier. In 1869 Floriana's parish priest got the title of archpriest. Work on a new facade (designed by Nikola Zammit) began in 1884. Calcedonio Gatt's new main altar was consecrated in 1919 by Archbishop Maurus Caruana.

Italian artist Attilio Palombi began painting the walls of the church in 1907; others are the work of Joseph Briffa, Raphael Caruana, EV Cremona and Giovanni Vella. An important work of art by Giuseppe Calì (from 1912) was lost during World War II: air raids in 1942 left substantial damage (and meant that the church could not be used for various months).

The titular altarpiece was assumed - probably incorrectly - to have been painted by Antoine de Favray, while the titular statue (the suburb's "most precious treasure") was sculpted in wood by Vincenzo Dimech early in the nineteenth century.

This church was shown on the 25c value of the 2005 Battle of Malta set while the saint himself (or his statue) appears on nunerous stamps - beginning from 1926. It is finally worthwhile to note that Publius (mentioned in the Acts of the Apostles in the episode relating to St Paul's shipwreck) is traditionally described as Malta's first bishop and has been its patron saint since 1610.

# PROMOTING GOZO THROUGH PHILATELY Aurora Opera House

Band clubs have traditionally served as cultural institutions and — more generally - even as educational centres, their committees being interested in more than just marches!

The committee of the *Soċjetà Filarmonika Leone* (= Lion Philarmonic Society, often referred to as "tal-Iljun"), with the cooperation of numerous volunteers, began building the *Teatru tal-Opra Aurora* in the early seventies. The official inauguration took place on the 9 October 1976. The name was "borrowed" from the Aurora Theatre which had also been the property of the *Soċjetà*. Since 1963, this theatre had been showing films on a regular basis and had offered theatrical and variety shows.

Just three months after the official opening of the *Teatru tal-Opra*, Puccini's opera Madame Butterfly was staged. Being the first lyric opera ever in Gozo, it can be said to have revived this art in Malta and to have begun a transformation of local culture-oriented activities. In fact it was followed by a string of other opera productions, under the baton of various renowned conductors such as Alberto Leone and Giovanni Veneri (Italy), Joseph Sammut (Malta) and Gozitans Joseph Vella and Colin Attard (the current resident conductor). The list of performers is very impressive, including well-known sopranos, mezzo-sopranos, tenors, baritones and basses. The

current dearth of such live shows in the islands creates so huge a demand that Gozo Channel has to adapt the times of its ferry crossings to fit the needs of patrons from Malta!

Besides operas (an average of almost one a year), the *Aurora* has hosted a range of other productions. To limit ourselves to the first years, worth a mention are surely the *Ballet de Paris*, the Moscow Ballet Theatre, *Carousel* and Russian and Chinese acrobatic groups. Light entertainment shows and rock concerts have moreover witnessed the participation of a number of international personalities.

With a seating capacity of 1600, spacious orchestra pit and excellent acoustics, it has been described as our only theatre with specific architectural requirements to host lyric operas. The beautiful and original decoration complements perfectly this most attractive opera house. These designs are the work of the well-known Maltese artist Prof Chev Emvin Cremona – and in fact they are obviously similiar (probably ideologically identical!) to what he used on the **1973 Christmas** miniature sheet.



It need hardly be noted that the *Teatru tal-Opra Aurora* is run by volunteers who dedicate their time and resources for the love of the art, striving hard towards professional results: a "love story"!

# stamp terms used in PHILATELY (38)

(Emanuel Vella)

#### Missionaries:

Name applied to the early type-set issue of Hawaii. They were used by







missionaries on the island to send letters home. There are few surviving copies.

Mixed Perforations: Sheets of stamp badly perforated in one gauge have been known to be backed with narrow stamps of gummed paper and re-perforated to another gauge, thus producing stamps with two opposed sides in

different perforations. This happened with certain New Zealand issue in 1901.

O: An accepted abbreviation in philately signifying 'ordinary' as opposed to 'chalky' or other unusual paper or finish of a printed stamp.



- **O.A.S** On stamps means an active service.
- **O.A.T.:** Onward air transmission.
- *O.D.E.C.A.*: (Spanish) Organisation de Estados Centro Americanos = Central American state Organisation.

- O.F. Castelloriso: Occupation Française, Castelrosso.
- **O.g.:** Original gum. Denoting that the mucilage as originally applied is still intact. **P.g.** = part gum.
- **O.H.B.M.S.:** On His Britannic Majesty's Service. O/p on German East African fiscals 1915.
- O.H.E.M.S.: On His Exalted Majesty's service. On Egypt's 1922 'Officials'.
- **O.H.H.S.:** On His Highness Service. On the Khedive's 'Officials' of Egypt 1907-22. Preceding the above.
- **O.H.M.S.:** On His/Her Highness Majesty's Service. Franked for official correspondence G.B.
- O.K.C.A.: Russian special Corps Northern Army.
- O.L.: French Origine Locale. Overprinted on stamps of Monaco as a control on mail posted in Monte Carlo Superior (French Territory) up to 1904.
- *O.M.F.:*Occupation Militaire Francoise. Overprinted on stamps of France 1920-2 for Cilicia and for Syria.



- **O.N.F** Castellorizo: Occupation Navale Françoise.
- *O/p:* generally means overprinted.

# E & O not E (29)

glances at stamps with design or printing mistakes (well-known or obscure)

In 1933 Italy entered the sport theme by issuing four stamps on the occasion of the International University Games held in Turin. As often in those years, a "political" message was not missing; in fact the single design features the *stele Mussolini*: an obelisk at Rome's *Foro Italico* (just inaugurated - in 1932 - as *Foro Mussolini*). This sports complex, designed by the important "regime" architect Enrico Del Debbio, was not completely finalized until the late 60s.

Besides the actual buildings, numerous statues - donated by the provinces - represent different sports. The obelisk is most prominent: over 17 metres of white marble, with a total height double that, created by Costantino Costantin. It is inscribed,

in huge vertical letters, MUSSOLINI DUX ("Dux" or, more commonly, *Duce* being dictator Benito Mussolini's "imperial" title).

An attentive study of the stamps brings out a strange "error": A Pesci has reproduced the lettering in reverse order (INILOSSUM XUD). The reason remains uncertain, possibly aiming at increased legibility.



To continue with Fascism, a few months earlier the tenth anniversary of the "March on Rome" had been



commemorated through a long set (Italy's longest ever nondefinitive: twenty stamps). D Mezzana's designs were mostly of a symbolic nature.

The 15 centesimi shows a soldier, with a

ship in the background. The boat is obviously moving, which means that someone has erred - designer or captain. I am no sailor but I understand that naval practice would not allow that flag at the bow (only used when at anchor or quayed),






When the idea cropped up at an early committee meeting, none of us dreamt that it would develop so rapidly into a periodical whose name has actually become incorrect! Although GPS activities (including the annual Exhibition and AGM) are reported and a Diary appears in almost all issues, most of the chock-full pages contain general philatelic information

illustrated articles.

The humble 8-pager Newsletter 1 appeared on 12 February 2000; the humdrum cover remained with hardly any variation until issue 15 inaugurated a series of "then and now" photos. After a special for the 5th anniversary of our Society, the idea was slightly altered from No19 to show a stamp and a


begin highlighting recent Covers produced by the GPS.

France: Paris is in danger as this aeroplane is flying over the Capital without a tail radar, but it seems that for the French Post this can be achieved without any problem. Stamp issued in 1936.

What is the time? The minute hand shows that it is not 12.00 yet, but the hour hand shows it is past 12.00. So what time is it?





This stamp was issued in 1957 in 3 different values. It is a beautifully engraved stamp, but the engraver's name is inverted. (left hand side of the stamp. No wonder that this stamp was issued to honour the Public Works.

Who is he? According to the inscription on the bottom of the stamp this gentleman is Jean-Nicolas Corvisart, who was an important figure in the history of French medicine. But the picture on the stamp shows his nephew Louis.

# 7 - The "12 islands" (1912)

The Dodecanese islands are a group of Greek islands in the south-east of the Aegean Sea (and thus usually identified in English as the Aegean Islands). Also considered as part of the Southern Sporades, they consist of twelve - as evidenced by the literal meaning of the Greek name - small islands (and other islets) with the bigger Rhodes as administrative centre. They declared independence from Turkey in 1912 but Italy occupied them even before prepared stamps could be issued formally. The Italian administration overprinted "EGEO" two definitives showing King Vittorio Emanuele. These were in













fact short-lived since by the end of the vear a set of seven became available with the overprinted name (some Italianized) of the individual islands: Calimno, Caso, Cos, Karki, Leros, Lipso, Nisiros, Patmos, Piscopi, Scarpanto, Simi, Stampalia and Rodi This idea can well be considered as the precursor of the "unnecessary" entities which


