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Chairman's Address



Professor John Rizzo Naudi, M.D., B.Sc., F.R.C.P. (Edin.)

The years 2008 and 2009 have been quite eventful and rich in experience. During these two years the Institute of Health Care made the important move from the inadequate building that had originally housed the old School of Nurses at St. Luke's Hospital and settled in the new purpose-built premises at Mater Dei Hospital near the Medical School and the Library. The Institute of Health Care now operates on a single floor with offices for the administrative and academic members of the staff that facilitates easier communication between the various departments. The new premises at Mater Dei also have fully functioning laboratories for the various divisions and are equipped with the latest technologies and facilities for the students' practical sessions.

The original mission statement of the Institute – "To achieve excellence in the education and training of reflective, caring, accountable health professionals, in response to the health and health service needs of the population," which was formulated in 1992, reflected the needs and the social climate of the Maltese Islands at that time but is very relevant today.

The IHC has grown in stature and beyond recognition during the last twenty years. Over the last ten years the Institute began to put a greater emphasis on research as part of the formation of our academics and has been assisting them in attaining postgraduate qualifications at Masters and Doctoral levels. This has proved a good investment and it is a great pleasure to report that six academic members of staff completed their doctoral studies during 2008/2009 and that at present nine out of ten divisions have members of staff with Ph.D.'s.

When one takes into consideration that twenty years ago there were no Maltese members of staff who were in possession of post-graduate degrees, and we were heavily dependent on foreign staff to teach in our various courses, one must congratulate all our teaching staff for their dedication and commitment to the advancement of their various disciplines. We can today state that the vast majority of our teachers have attained post-graduate qualifications at Masters level without neglecting their teaching commitments.

We can also state that we are no longer dependent on foreign teachers for the running of our various courses. This fact must be recorded as the greatest achievement of the Institute of Health Care and the most important and urgent of its targets as stated in its mission statement at its birth twenty years ago.

We have to remember the difficulties and handicaps we had at that moment in time. Twenty years ago recruitment into the Health Care professions was a great problem and we used to have very few recruits with 'Advanced Level' degrees applying to join our courses. We must also note that historically 'Nursing' in particular had suffered, for various reasons, from a very poor image among the general public right up to the nineteen eighties and our gratitude should go to the few nursing students of that period who must be considered as the true 'pioneers' of the modern nursing profession. It is very satisfying to note that, over the last ten years, there has been a steady increase in the number of students entering our various courses; so much so, that today we have a problem of numbers and had to introduce a 'numerus clausus' for some of our courses on account of our limited facilities. As a matter of fact last summer (2009) we had the problem of selecting the admissions out of the several hundreds that had applied for the diploma and degree courses in Nursing Studies. At present we have a total of 888 students following courses in the ten divisions, while a total of 2,769 students graduated during the last ten years.

During the year 2009 discussions started at IHC Board level regarding the possibility of the Institute moving towards faculty status. The discussions focused mainly on the strategic analysis of each Division within the Institute of Health care, as well as the formulation of a future strategy that would define each Department within a Faculty of Health Sciences. Throughout the year several meetings were also held with the Rector, while the Director had meetings with the Secretary of the University and the Director, Human Resources Management and Development to explore the impact that a faculty status would have on the current human and financial resources. On 26th March 2010 the Rector encountered all the academic members of the IHC. During this meeting the Rector remarked on the great academic progress that had been made by the Institute over the last twenty years and that in his opinion the Institute was ready to become a faculty and that he would be setting in motion the necessary procedures for this purpose with Senate and Council of the University.

Another important event that has to be recorded for this year is the setting up of the Midwifery Division as a separate division from Nursing. Midwives in Malta have always been considered as a separate profession from nurses. As a matter of fact the University held three-year courses for midwives, at irregular periods from 1915 onwards until 1946 when they were taken over by the Department of Health. By 1958, midwives in Malta were "fully qualified to render the best service" but there were not enough of them, since there were no facilities in Malta for the training of midwives at that moment in time, and aspiring midwives had to go overseas (usually the UK) for training. In 1974, Miss Mary Vella Bondin took over the running of the Midwifery Training courses and of other educational programs related to Maternity Care and to in-service education of midwives until her retirement in 1993. With great sadness I have to report that this great pioneer and founder of Midwifery training in Malta died on 13th December 2009 mourned by all of us.

A shortage of trained midwives persisted and in the nineteen nineties the Institute of Health Care decided to hold four direct entry courses for midwives, which helped to relieve this problem.

An important initiative undertaken by the Institute of Health Care was the introduction in October 2009 of an E-learning B.Sc. (Honours) Degree with the aim of facilitating and providing more accessible education to qualified health care professionals by allowing flexibility and by decreasing the demands on the health service sector for the release of staff. This course was offered to health care professionals in possession of a 'Diploma' qualification and replaced previous diploma-to-degree programs that various divisions at the Institute were offering.

A major event that must be recorded was the successful organisation by the Nursing Division of the conference 'Nursing and Midwifery – A celebration of Care' that was held in May 2009 against the background of the global financial crisis.

The Institute of Health Care through its various Divisions has remained very active on the international front. Indeed, the Institute of Health Care has been quite heavily involved with staff and students' exchanges, as shown in the Divisional reports. Furthermore, the Institute of Health Care has invited a number of visiting lecturers and professors from international academic institutions, to deliver lectures to our undergraduate and postgraduate students.

In conclusion, I would like to thank the Director, Dr Sandra Buttigieg, the Coordinators of the various divisions and all the academic members of staff for their enthusiasm and dedication to the advancement of the Institute to its present academic level. In particular, I wish to thank all the administrative and technical members of staff for their hard work and continued support and assistance whenever it was required.

It is with great pleasure and satisfaction that I present this biennial report for 2008/2009.

Director's Address

This report covers the years 2008 and 2009, and therefore the first two years, in which the Institute of Health Care settled in the new premises of Mater Dei Hospital. I am pleased to say that the Institute of Health Care now operates on a single floor with offices for its staff and hosts fully functioning laboratories which are equipped with all the latest technologies intended to create up to date facilities for student practical sessions.

The years 2008 and 2009 have proved to be particularly busy and exciting on several counts. Our main aims remain that of attaining high educational and training levels in all the courses offered. Furthermore, our commitment towards strengthening the research profile has become a necessity for the academic standing of the Institute. I am also pleased to state that the support that was given by the University over the past ten years to academic members of staff to attain postgraduate qualifications has proved to be good investment. It is certainly a pleasure to mention that six academic members of staff successfully completed their doctoral studies in 2008/2009. Indeed, there are now academic members of staff with Ph.D.'s in nine out of ten Divisions.

During 2009, discussions started at IHC Board level regarding the possibility of the Institute moving towards Faculty status. The discussions focused mainly on the strategic analysis of each Division within the Institute of Health Care, as well as the formulation of a future strategy that would define each Department within a Faculty of Health Sciences. Throughout the year several meetings were also held with the Rector, the Secretary of the University and the Director, Human Resources Management and Development to explore the impact that a Faculty status would have on the current human and financial resources.

Another major happening in the academic year 2008/2009, was the setting up of the new or rather separate Midwifery Division. It was agreed that since midwives constituted a separate professional body to nurses, the Nursing and Midwifery Division could be separated into two Divisions. Indeed, the demarcation had also occurred previously as regards their education and training programmes in that midwives were no longer required to qualify as nurses prior to attaining their midwifery qualification. The decision to integrate the two professions in one division was taken at the inception of the IHC, when

the Coordinator at that time was both a nurse and midwife. In view of the constant expansion in the programmes of studies offered by the Nursing Division and the ever increasing number of students, the reduction in size of the Division has also turned out to be more manageable from an administrative point of view.

With regard to our courses, I would like to mention that with effect from October 2009, all diploma and degree nursing programmes of studies have been changed from four to three year duration. This entailed a major restructuring of the programmes, which now project a more integrated approach to teaching and learning. I would also like to mention that the Institute of Health Care introduced a new e-learning B.Sc.(Honours), with the aim of providing more accessible education to qualified health care professionals by allowing flexibility and by decreasing the demands on the health service sector for the release of staff. This new Health Science course was offered for the first time in October 2009 to health care professionals in possession of a Diploma qualification and replaced previous diploma-to-degree programmes that various Divisions at the Institute were offering.

A major event for the Institute was the organization of the conference 'Nursing & Midwifery – A Celebration of Care' between the 27th and 29th May 2009. The Nursing and Midwifery Divisions organized this conference to commemorate the 20th Anniversary of the introduction of Nursing and Midwifery programmes within the University of Malta. The conference's keynote speakers were Dr Alfred Caruana Galizia, President of the Sovereign Military Hospitaller Order of Saint John of Jerusalem of Rhodes and of Malta, Professor Ingalill Rahm Hallberg, Professor in Health Care Science, Lund University, Sweden and President of the European Academy of Nursing Science and Professor Kathryn L. Vigen, Professor Emeritus North Park University, Chicago.

The Institute of Health Care has remained very active on the international front. Indeed, the Institute of Health Care through its Divisions has been quite heavily involved with staff and students' exchanges, as shown in the Divisional reports. Furthermore, the Institute of Health Care has invited a number of visiting lecturers and professors from international academic institutions, to deliver lectures to our undergraduate and postgraduate students.

In conclusion, I would like to thank Professor John Rizzo Naudi for his continuous support and direction. I would also like to express my gratitude to all the members of staff, be they academic or support for their hard work and contribution. Therefore, it gives me great pleasure to present this biennial report, which reflects the hard work undertaken by all the members of staff.

Action Research in the Development of a Physiotherapy Curriculum – A Means to an End

Introduction

Physiotherapy was introduced to the Mediterranean island state of Malta following the poliomyelitis epidemic of 1943. For the next 30 years, the service was staffed by expatriate British physiotherapists and Maltese physiotherapists trained in the UK In 1976, a training course was begun on the island using the curriculum of the Chartered Society of Physiotherapy (C.S.P.), the physiotherapists' professional body in the UK The course tutor was a British expatriate and a member of the C.S.P. Despite far-reaching changes in education of physiotherapists in the UK in the last quarter of the 20th century, the Maltese curriculum could be said to be stuck in a time warp, more suited to health needs in the UK in the 1970s and 1980s than to health needs in Malta following the new millennium. In 1992, the physiotherapy course was incorporated into the Institute of Health Care (IHC) of the University of Malta (UoM) and the qualification was upgraded from a diploma to a degree.

Objective of the Study

Earlier investigation of locally trained physiotherapists' perceptions of the physiotherapy course at the IHC revealed that past students were dissatisfied with certain components of the course (Sacco 1999). This quantitative research produced some alarming data. For example: 84% of all the respondents considered the course to be stressful and only 11% thought that it allowed them to reflect on and critically evaluate their development as a physiotherapist. Only 18% of the respondents thought that the clinical teaching delivered during the course met their needs, and 64% were not satisfied with the clinical supervision available to them. These initial data, together with reports delivered by senior clinical staff regarding the quality of physiotherapy practised by newly qualified physiotherapists (Board of Studies 2002), led the author to the conclusion that a total revision of the course curriculum was required.

Aims of the Study

The aim of the study was to initiate changes to the physiotherapy course curriculum in order to educate and train the Maltese physiotherapist to the high standards the new health service expects and requires. This new physiotherapist is expected to be a) proficient in the skills necessary to practise the profession, b) clinically and research orientated, and c) confident enough to carry the responsibility of being an autonomous, diagnosing professional.

Physiotherapy education commenced in 1976 with a curriculum inherited from the Chartered Society of Physiotherapy in England (D.H. 1976). The course content of the Physiotherapy course in Malta might have started out as a 'clone' of the Chartered Society of Physiotherapy, but has developed as a 'hybrid', a cross between the C.S.P. course taken

as a core together with the introduction of new subjects. The need for a curriculum that targeted conditions and pathologies specific to the island was highlighted, which together with the fear expressed by some of the clinical members of staff regarding medical dominance via the referral system also illuminated the author of this research that the involvement of the clinical staff was going to be necessary, not just as participants to collect data, but as partners within an action research based study. The literature also highlighted the need for change within the assessment and the teaching and learning that is currently taking place, to review, improve and implement such changes will involve all the primary stakeholders of the physiotherapy curriculum. Hence, the need to involve the students, academic and administrative staff into the research team all working with one eventual goal, the development of a new curriculum that will meet all the needs that each stakeholder considers necessary. Other factors that influence the curriculum directly or indirectly are health care policies and changes that sway the health service. The fact the Government has invested heavily building Mater Dei Hospital and the new rehabilitation hospital that still has to be built, reinforces the need for change from a secondary health care system to one that is going to have to place more emphasis on primary health care acted as the impetus to promote change and the reason why this study was considered necessary and urgent. Another factor that influenced change was the fact that the course was so over assessed encouraging students to develop shallow learning inhibiting inquisition thus eliminating the need for life-long learning. Other factors included the Final Comprehensive Examinations perceived as a cause of unnecessary anxiety to both students and staff and the fact that students had to wait 24 months prior to becoming clinically effective and getting into contact with the practical aspect of physiotherapy. At this stage it became evident that the physiotherapy curriculum was considered outdated and no longer appropriate for autonomous physiotherapists to meet the health needs of the island in the new millennium.

The Curriculum

The course has had the theoretical component praised by foreign modulators on more than one occasion (Selfe 2005, 2006; Lindquist 2007, 2008, 2009) and the Board of Studies are aware that the present curriculum provides a sound theoretical knowledge base, yet are also conscious that the reasoning and treatment skills are lacking. The literature has highlighted a number of inadequacies in the present curriculum. Earlier research showed (Sacco 2004) that there is concern that newly-qualified physiotherapists do not possess the practice skills expected of them by their employers about levels of preparedness for practice (Aquilina 2003) hence not meeting the fitness for practice expectations. However, it is the believe of the Board of Studies that following a short period of time at work, newly-qualified physiotherapists will develop, becoming effective, capable practitioners with critical reasoning skills. This new proposed curriculum has a validated competency framework, built around a new modular system on the effective delivery and integration of theory and practice within the four year programme, because it is the believe that the aim of the physiotherapy curriculum is to produce 'knowledgeable practitioners'. curriculum ought to meet all the criteria to guarantee that new graduates will reach the standard to practise safely and efficiently as expected both by the profession and the state.

THEORETICAL BASIS OF PHYSIOTHERAPY EDUCATION


The education of physiotherapy has undergone a number of changes as the profession and its education has developed over the last hundred years. The behavioural theories of education were followed by the cognitive learning theories in which a problem solving approach was utilised. By the early 80s the concepts of critical thinking and reflective practice were introduced to the education of physiotherapists. Literature has demonstrated that the curriculum is much more than just a syllabus of study, but ought to be viewed as a programme of learning. The modern approach to physiotherapy education now revolves around problem solving by means of critical thinking. Modern educational theories adaptable to the education of physiotherapy were researched. The general conceptions of deep and surface learning appear to be consistent and the factors including the teaching manner and course assessment have to be convergent to influence learning. The most striking change is that there has been a transition from education and training to learning. Students, nowadays, have become more demanding and no longer accept what is being taught as truth that has to be memorised. As a result, a paradigm shift has come about: instead of learning being teacher led, it has become student led. Learning by doing, discussion and independent learning all have to be encouraged. The theory underpinning the model for curriculum development considered the most suitable was the '3P' model described by Biggs (2003). This model appears to be linear flowing from left to right. The student approaches education with a set number of attributes, called the presage factors. These are then influenced by a process that describes the approaches to learning that the institute where the education is taking place undertakes. Finally Biggs describes the learning outcomes as the product, taken as a conscientious, efficient, reflective practitioner.

The Research Path: Philosophy and Methodology

Typical of the classical participatory action researcher, Action Research became the methodology of choice because of the dual role of the author: that of course leader and participator, meaning that of practitioner and interventionist. Hence, Action Research became the methodology used to improve the physiotherapy curriculum at the IHC The study delved deeper than the limited scope of designing a new 'ideal' curriculum. It led to a methodology that added to the existing theories of knowledge and was designed to cater for the needs of a profession or institution that intends to commence a course from scratch or improve on an established one.

Preparatory research confirmed that researching the curriculum means much more than just researching the actual content. For the content of the curriculum to be pertinent to local health needs and meet academic, professional, cultural and political needs imposed upon it, input from all the stakeholders is necessary. Denzin and Lincoln (1994 p2) assert that "Qualitative research is about other people studied in their own social setting and understood in terms of the meaning those people themselves bring to their situation". Patients and students are major stakeholders as much as qualified practitioners and health purchasers, such as the Maltese Ministry of Health.

The Process for Curriculum Development



As the project progressed, it became evident that answering the research questions required the iterative process of Action Research. Reason (2001) implies that the main reason behind academic research is to contribute to an abstract "body of knowledge" available to third-persons, however, "In contrast the primary purpose of action research is to develop practical knowing, embodied moment-to-moment action by research/practitioner" (Reason 2001 p2). If the simplest definition of Action Research is "learning by doing", in which a group of people, or an individual, identifies a problem (research), does something to resolve it (action), sees how successful their efforts have been (reflection), and if not satisfied, tries again, then this paradigm suited this study.

This study was typical of action research in that it consisted of a number of cycles (Kolb 1984). These cycles were integrated together into a spiral, as the end of each cycle acted as the catalyst to commence the next. It ought to be emphasised that at the end of each cycle the outcome was a consensus of the participants. This issue is important to this study as the final outcome was a new curriculum that was considered to be ideal by all the stakeholders and participants.

The purpose of the first cycle was to confirm the researcher's hypothesis that the physiotherapy curriculum was outdated and needed to be changed in order to meet the island's medical needs. The opinions and views of all the primary stakeholders were researched and noted. The outcome of the first cycle was that the old curriculum being taught at the IHC was considered dated, very stressful, not conducive to deep learning and critical thinking hence required immediate change. This first cycle consisted of an initial focus group interview. Taking part in this interview were the two full-time academic members of staff, a principal, senior and junior members of the clinical staff working at St. Luke's Hospital and a final year student. Riding the wave of their initial enthusiasm regarding their empowerment to actually play a part in the designing of a new curriculum, all participants of the first cycle were asked to become active participants in this Action Research study. Following this group interview, the participants held meetings with their counterparts and another set of individual in-depth semi-structured interviews with the original participants took place.

The second cycle consisted of a retrospective study into the previous curricula held in Malta researching the curricula of fourteen other universities that have a long history in physiotherapy education within the E.U. and a study of the medical conditions referred to physiotherapy within the state hospitals over a six month period. The academic staff who taught the speciality and the clinician in charge of that unit later held meetings and developed modules that were related to the occurrence of referral; in this manner a proposed curriculum matching the local medical needs was designed.

The third cycle meant returning to the primary stakeholders (the final students and newly qualified staff), to investigate their opinions about the new proposed curriculum. Following this meeting, the participants again held meetings with their counterparts and this was followed by focused individual in-depth semi-structured interviews. Two other interviews were also carried out during this cycle with the co-ordinators of the Radiography

and Occupational Therapy Divisions to investigate whether the problems that the physiotherapy division experienced with the curriculum were present in other divisions.

The next step in the research cycle was to investigate the views and opinions of the public as they were considered to be one of the major stakeholders of this study. The involvement of the public in health and education is well documented and proven to promote positive changes (Taylor and Le Riche 2006). This cycle consisted of eight in-depth semi-structured interviews with members of the public who were both inpatients and outpatients attending state physiotherapy and patients attending private physiotherapy within a private hospital or clinic. Their perceptions regarding the physiotherapy service being presently offered and their views regarding the medical and physiotherapy professions were of particular importance and require further investigation. Having evaluated the data obtained from this cycle any direct or indirect suggestions were discussed with the Curriculum Research Committee and the curriculum was further updated where necessary.

The fifth cycle consisted of unstructured/open elite interviews with influential stakeholders who either directly or indirectly influence the curriculum and one other unstructured interview to a senior member of clinical staff. At the end of this cycle, that culminated with the Registrar's representative at the IHC in an attempt to review and approve the new curriculum prior to presenting to the IHC Board for approval, it became evident that changes to the new 'ideal' curriculum were necessary, as in its present state this was not acceptable to the office of the Registrar. The most important outcome of this fifth research cycle was that the physiotherapy course is held in high esteem by the university administration, but the format of the new proposed curriculum was not acceptable to the Registrar's Office for administrative purposes.

As a result, a sixth cycle was introduced, to alter the proposed new curriculum into one that meets all the administrative rules and regulations. This consisted of a number of meetings between the academic staff, and a meeting between the academic staff and the Registrar's representative. Another final meeting with the Curriculum Research Committee took place in which the new proposed curriculum was discussed and following mutual agreement, this was considered to be 'ideal' at the time.

In order to finalise this study, it was considered necessary to include a final seventh cycle, whereby all the newly qualified staff who were final year students during the first cycle, were again presented with the changes that took place to the curriculum and by means of Q-Methodology had their feedback objectively concluded. Q Methodology is a method for exploring dominant perceptions or patterns of thought within participants. In essence, it was a method that helped to capture the richness and complexity of the various statements presented to them. It was used primarily to identify groups with correlating or conflicting values, preferences and opinions to better understand the differences. It helped to identify the potential areas of the research data findings. In other words, Q Methodology was a complementary tool offering insight and triangulation to the findings of the previous action research cycles.

O Methodology was introduced by William Stephenson in 1935. It "combines the strengths of both qualitative and quantitative research traditions" (Dennis & Goldberg 1996 p104) and can also be viewed as providing a bridge between the two (Sell & Brown 1984). Q Methodology is a technique for the objective study of subjective findings and allows the researcher to understand and interpret the subjective data of his or her respondents (Smith 2001). Typically, in Q Methodology, respondents called the P-Set are asked to rank-order a set of statements (particular themes taken from the Action Research Cycles) from their individual point of view using a quasi-normal distribution according to a scale, usually from strongly agree (+3) to strongly disagree (-3), with scale scores provided to assist the participant to think and answer about the task. These individual subjective ratings are then subject to factor analysis resulting in an objective outcome. Stephenson (1935) described Q Methodology as an inversion of conventional factor analysis, in that Q correlates to the respondents as opposed to the number of tests. Correlation between respondents thus indicates similar or different views that exist on a particular issue (Brown 1995). The factors resulting from Q Analysis thus represents clusters of subjectivity, (the views of the respondents) as opposed to traditional research that would reveal a population of respondents (Risdon et al 2003).

The data obtained in the early stages resulted in a reduction of study-unit assessments. The inclusion of common core study-units into their related modules meant that students would concurrently be learning subjects relating to one another, a departure from the conventional medical model of education that was used on the Island, to a holistic model of patient care. The change and improvement in the design of the course resulted in the 'ideal' curriculum, but this challenged the administration office of the University. The amalgamation of study-units into modules and the assessment of these modules could not be handled by the Registrar's Office, as they did not conform to the software used to record results. As a consequence, this 'ideal' curriculum had to be altered in such a manner that made it acceptable.

This resulted in the development of two curricula. The first curriculum was the 'ideal curriculum' that met the requirements of the entire profession and primary stakeholders, but not those of the administrative staff. The second curriculum met all the professional, administrative and academic requirements laid down by the University, yet not those of the primary stakeholders. The 'ideal' curriculum was selected because the primary stakeholders are the more important factor in this equation. It was not implemented for administrative reasons.

This study confirmed that the problems the Physiotherapy Division was facing within the curriculum were also present in two other divisions with inherited curricula, chosen randomly from all those that constitute the IHC Most divisions follow professional curricula that have been imported from countries overseas, more often than not, the UK (Jaccarini 2004), (Bezzina 2003), (Mifsud 2003).

The study has brought about change. The actual methodology and the development of the 'ideal' curriculum can be used as a protocol. Any other division within the IHC, as well as any other country where the teaching of physiotherapy has not yet commenced, such as

Cyprus, Luxembourg or Liechtenstein, in Europe (WCPT 2003), or any country that has imported a physiotherapy curriculum from another country and wants to adopt a new curriculum particular to their own specific needs can use this protocol.

Finally, the most important outcome of this study is not an 'ideal' physiotherapy curriculum or the actual 'protocol' for curricular development, but is something deeper and intangible: something 'philosophical'. This study has become a 'force for change'. A single concept has the power to transform thinking, enrich the work environment and produce change.

The new curriculum helped draw the clinical staff, students and academic staff together, forming a common circle of learners and implementers. This helped kindle a spirit of change that is being put into practice at various levels within the university and clinical setting. It was very important for all the contributors to realise and have a clear understanding of the new curriculum and the process of change that this generated. If this change were to be successful, then all concerned had to be involved, consulted and informed, as effective change requires effective communication. The new curriculum was designed to give students the academic foundation and practical training to understand, predict and respond to clinical challenges. Students were involved in the initial curriculum development process as the primary stakeholders at the very heart of change. This curriculum not only incorporates the notions of evidence-based learning; it also encourages students to become life long learners and more importantly, having been taught how to think enables them to become 'agents for change'. If change to the educational system and health services on the Island is to take place, then the future workforce had to be involved and be given the necessary skills and opportunity to become part of this change.

The study had a domino effect that eventually challenged the university administration. Unfortunately, both the outcome of this research and the curriculum development team has 'responsibility without authority', and can influence 'change' but not dictate it.

The research into the curriculum is the force to implement change: a change that takes place on several fronts. Change can only come about if there is a willingness to accept it and this is necessary at both academic staff level and, more importantly, at top managerial level within the University structure. Change issues are not only human issues but also involve culture and subcultures of an organisation such as the University of Malta.

1. Programmes of studies offered by the nursing division in october 2009.

The Nursing Division aims to prepare competent and caring nurses and midwives capable of equal partnership in the interdisciplinary health service.

The following pre registration courses were offered to the October 2009 Intake of students:

- Bachelor of Science (Honours) in Nursing,
- Bachelor of Science (Honours) in Mental Health Nursing
- Bachelor of Science (Honours) Diploma to Degree in Mental Health Nursing,
- Bachelor of Science (Honours) Diploma to Degree in Community Nursing.
- Bachelor of Health Science.
- Diploma Health Science (Nursing).

October 2009 saw the launch of a new 3 year diploma in health science and a 3 year B.Sc. (Hons) Nursing. These programmes were launched following an evaluation and review of

the pre-existing four year programmes to take into account feedback provided over the years by practitioners, students and academic members of staff. This review was undertaken by Dr Maria Cassar and Ms Dorianne Coleiro. The main feature of these three year programmes is an emphasis on the personal and professional development of students in addition to the previous emphasis on practical competence and knowledge and an integrative approach to teaching and learning to allow students to appreciate the holistic nature of care in terms of meeting the physical, social, psychological and spiritual needs of the person.

A total of 162 students were admitted to these two programmes of studies following an advertisement campaign carried out by the Institute of Health Care and the Health Division.

October 2009 also saw the first intake of students to a full-time B.Sc. in Mental Health Nursing.

October 2009, saw the launch of the B.Sc. in Health Science programme which was initiated by members of staff of the Nursing Division, particularly Dr Michelle Camilleri who initiated development of this course programme which was further developed with the collaboration of other divisions within the IHC. This programme of studies was designed to take into consideration the difficulties experienced by members of staff in continuing their studies due to problems with release from their duties to attend day courses as well as the impact this was having on the service area. This programme of studies is innovative in taking a multidisciplinary approach, with the use of a blended approach of direct student contact and e-learning. Fifty-four students enrolled in the first intake to the programme of studies which replaced the B.Sc. in nursing diploma to degree course.

The following continuing professional development courses were offered to qualified nurses in October 2009:

- Basic life support provider.
- Neonatal Resuscitation instructor.
- Mentorship
- Infection Control and Precautions.

- 14 April 2008 18 April 2008 The Occupational Therapy Division hosted Ms Jennifer Creek, freelance visiting lecturer from the UK, who taught a course in *Advanced Occupational Therapy Psychosocial Clinical Skills* to the undergraduate occupational therapy programme intake 2005.
- 24 April, 6 May and 15 May 2008 Ms Joanna Chetcuti held three *Vision Plan Meetings* involving all Occupational Therapy staff in Malta and Gozo. These meetings also included IHC staff and 3rd Year students. The meetings took the form of workshops intended to create a working plan for the next five years for the occupational therapy profession. A report and a working document was drawn up and various sub-committees and working groups were set up as a result of the vision plan.
- June 2008 Ms Joanna Chetcuti set up a *Public Relations Committee* which aims to create more awareness of the occupational therapy profession in three main spheres: the general public, other professionals and prospective students. The first area tackled was

the promotion of the profession within schools with the intention of attracting suitable potential candidates. This is in order to sustain the profession and ensure that adequate numbers enter Occupational Therapy courses. The members of this subcommittee met to devise promotional materials such as brochures, PowerPoint presentations and DVDs for use in Fifth and Sixth Forms and the Junior College. It is the aim of this subcommittee to promote the profession in the most comprehensive and accessible fashion possible.

1 – 3 September 2008 Ms Marjorie Bonello and Ms Cynthia Scerri attended the International Conference: celebrating Innovation and Excellence: making change happen at the Dementia Services Development Centre, University of Stirling, Scotland. This conference was of particular interest to all those who support people with dementia, including rehabilitation professionals, educators and policy makers. The programme addressed a range of issues and explored the latest thinking and developments in service improvement. Broad themes included the social and cultural contexts of dementia, policy and practice in dementia care, ensuring better knowledge, developing dementia research and non-pharmacological interventions. The experience of attending such a conference was very fruitful in getting informed about the latest trends and research in dementia as well as for laying the foundations for future collaborations with the Dementia Services Development Centre (DSDC) at the University of Stirling. This is a renowned centre of excellence in the UK both for service development as well as for training and education within this field.

• September 2008 - Ms Nathalie Buhagiar undertook a study visit to the Cardiff University, Wales. Here she liaised with the Occupational Therapy Division represented by Ms Sue Delport and International Affairs Officer Mr Gareth Morgan mainly to pave the way for an Erasmus bilateral agreement which could cater for student and staff movement, as well as the exchange of clinical knowledge related to the field of pediatric practice.

2009

Introduction

• The year 2009 was characterised by the continued comprehensive promotional drive of the occupational therapy profession and the undergraduate course coordinated with the clinical sector through the occupational therapy manager Ms Joanna Chetcuti which had been initiated in 2008. These marketing activities included: regular PR meetings; talks to career guidance teachers; visits to the Occupational Therapy Department at Mater Dei Hospital by prospective students; increasing the awareness of occupational therapy with the general public and with other professionals; launching of an occupational therapy promotional DVD; participation at Career Fairs (St Aloysius College, Giovanni Curmi, Naxxar; Mediterranean Conference Centre, Mater Dei Foyer) and the production of an occupational therapy information leaflet.

Overview of Salient Events

- 10-13 March 2009 The Division hosted Dr Anne E. K. Roberts in the capacity of visiting lecturer. Dr Roberts is Principal Lecturer and course leader of the M.Sc. Occupational Therapy programme offered at the University of Plymouth. Dr Roberts taught the course Quality Assurance: The Role of Outcome Measurement and Evidence Based Practice as part of the *Professional Issues in Occupational Therapy (OCT4103)* study unit to the undergraduate course intake 2005.
- 13-17 July 2009 The Division hosted Professor Pamela Richardson Ph.D., OTR/L, FAOTA, as an external examiner. Dr Richardson is a professor and director of the post-professional Master's degree program in the Department of Occupational Therapy at San Jose State University in California. She is a Fellow of the American Occupational Therapy Association (FAOTA). She has served on the editorial board of the American Journal of Occupational Therapy and is a member of the Board of Directors of the National Board of Certification in Occupational Therapy. Her research interests include social participation of individuals with disabilities, occupational justice, community program development, and educational methodologies that link academia and practice. She is the author of a number of scholarly articles and book chapters.

- During her visit Dr Richardson, over and above her duties as an external examiner, also undertook a number of ancillary activities. She held an informal round table half-day session discussion with Divisional staff on the issue of undergraduate project work, specifically on how to work most effectively with students on small-scale research projects. She also taught a clinical workshop to the paediatric occupational therapy staff on the use of integrated playgroup interventions for children with autism spectrum disorders.
- The highlight of her visit was the public lecture she gave entitled *Occupational* justice: A framework for occupational therapy practice in the 21st century?

The following is the abstract submitted for promotion of this public lecture:

"Occupational justice has been defined as "the ethical, moral, and civil principles in providing for occupational needs" (Townsend & Whiteford, 2005). Occupational justice expands the core occupational therapy concepts of client-centred, contextually focused intervention to consider how the larger social and political environments influence the ability of individuals and communities to engage in meaningful occupations. The worldwide occupational justice movement has engaged scholars in occupational therapy and occupational science in dialogue about how occupational justice concepts should influence the scope, focus, and theoretical foundations of occupational therapy, but thus far has had less influence on practicing therapists. This workshop will introduce the concept of occupational justice and address how it can be integrated into daily occupational therapy practice. The conceptual foundations of occupational justice and the global health and wellness initiatives that support an occupational justice perspective will be presented. Case studies of the application of occupational justice principles will be presented and discussed. Participants will have the opportunity to identify and analyze occupational justice issues in their practice settings and discuss how occupational therapists might address these issues in the scope of their practice within Maltese society." The public lecture was held on 16 July 2009.

- 14-16 September 2009 Ms Marjorie Bonello attended the International Conference: Facing the Future given by the Dementia Service Development Centre at York (UK) University of Stirling. The main theme of the conference responded to the National Dementia Strategy (UK) and the emerging strategies all across the world. The programme addressed a broad range of clinical, educational, social and quality-of-life issues for people with dementia.
- 23 October 2009 Ms Joanna Chetcuti gave the opening speech at the Council of Occupational Therapists for the European Countries (COTEC) council meeting held in Malta at the Plaza Hotel in Sliema. This council meeting of COTEC was a sterling opportunity which helped to promote the occupational therapy services in Malta in the wider European context. It was also an opportunity for occupational therapists from different countries to share ideas on common interests and challenges being met in the service and educational sector.

- The Division of occupational therapy was represented by Mr. René Mifsud who was invited to participate in this event as an observer and spokesperson for the occupational therapy educational sector. Mr Mifsud gave an overview of the undergraduate occupational therapy programme and discussed issues concerning fieldwork practices, course content and pre-registration requirements.
- Through a traditional Maltese evening organised as part of hospitality activities and held at Palazzo Castellana, Dr Kenneth Grech, Permanent Secretary Health, the Elderly and Community Care was invited to meet COTEC delegates. This paved the way for meetings to the held between the local occupational therapy association and Dr Grech to discuss matters concerning the professional milieu.
- November 2009 Ms Marjorie Bonello attended a Workshop for Doctoral students at the UK Occupational Therapy Research Foundation (UKOTRF) in London. This workshop offered the opportunity to meet with eminent research leaders, to learn about thinking at a doctoral level, to consider how a post-doctoral career can be developed, to network with other health care doctoral students and to hear about the support that is available from College of Occupational Therapists and UKOTRF.



2008

The following is an overview of the year 2008:

- The student intake was of sixteen students.
- One member of staff has completed his doctoral research and graduated as Doctors
 of Philosophy. Another three members of staff (two full-time and the other parttime) have commenced the research process that is projected to last for the next six
 years.
- The Division is currently carrying out research into the Physiotherapy Curriculum and the Treatment of Stroke in the Home Environment together with the development of the clinical reasoning process in physiotherapy students on a local and possibly European basis.
- The Physiotherapy Division provided consultation to past students who are reading for masters' degrees with emphasis placed on methodology in qualitative and quantitative research. These students are all attending courses at universities in the United Kingdom.
- The Final Comprehensive Examination was moderated by Dr Ingrid Lindquist from the Karolinska Institute, Stockholm. Her report with regards to examination procedures and certain management policies helped the Division in the process of the continuous development of the Physiotherapy Course and have fostered changes in the format of examinations in the future.

- The Physiotherapy Division staff complement is of three full time members, five part time lecturers and two occasional lecturers.
- Students from overseas are making use of the facilities offered by the Physiotherapy division to attend clinical placements in Malta. The Physiotherapy Division has received various students from European countries who spent time in Malta mostly in the clinical field. Countries of origin were Finland, Germany, Holland, Italy, Norway, Sweden and The United Kingdom. These clinical placements were spread throughout the year.
- The course coordinator Dr Mark Sacco attended various meetings in the process of preparation for a 'joint European Master of Science' degree in association with various European institutions.
- Continuous fine tuning and revision of course objectives for the B.Sc. (Honours) (Physiotherapy) in alignment with proposed curricular changes facilitated the adoption of a new teaching framework on the Physiotherapy studies course that now is in conformity with ECTS. The course objectives are constantly undergoing change to reflect demands and trends in society and the academic sphere.

The following is an overview of the year 2009

- The student intake was of fifteen students.
- One member of staff (Dr S. Lungaro-Mifsud) has completed his doctoral research and graduated Doctor of Philosophy. Another two members of staff (one full time (Mr T. Agius) and the other part time (Mr J. Xerri de Caro)) have commenced the research process.
- The Division is currently carrying out research and development of the Physiotherapy Curriculum and the Treatment of Stroke in the Home Environment together with the development of the clinical reasoning process in physiotherapy students on a local (and across universities) with the link being centered in the United Kingdom. Another study addresses the provision of services to patients suffering from Parkinson's disease.
- The Physiotherapy Division provided consultation to past students who are reading for Masters' degrees with emphasis placed on methodology in qualitative and quantitative research. These students are all attending courses at the University of Malta and various universities in the United Kingdom.
- The Final Comprehensive Examination was moderated by Dr Ingrid Lindquist from the Karolinska Institutet, Stockholm. As in previous years her report with regards to examination procedures and certain management policies have helped the Division in the process of the continuous development of the Physiotherapy Course and have facilitated the fine tuning process that is vital for the format of examinations in the future.
- The Physiotherapy Division staff complement is composed of three full time members, five part time lecturers and two occasional lecturers.
- Students from overseas are making use of the facilities offered by the Physiotherapy division to attend clinical placements in Malta. The Physiotherapy Division has received various students from European countries. Countries of origin were Finland, Germany, Holland, Italy, Norway, Spain, Sweden and The United Kingdom. These clinical placements were spread throughout the year.
- The course coordinator Dr Mark Sacco attended further meetings in the process of preparation for a 'joint International Master of Science' degree in association with Naestved UCSJ, Denmark and Universidad Cardenal Herrera, Spain.
- Members of staff attended the annual conference organised by the European Network of Physiotherapists in Higher Education (ENPHE) in Sweden and contributed actively to this organisation in advisory and administrative roles.

- This was followed up by a two day workshop attended by 42 participants in Malta that addressed three topics dealing with Curriculum Development, a joint European Masters' programme and Continuing Education.
- Members of staff form part of a working group that is Mapping the Future of the Physiotherapy Profession in Malta.
- One member of staff has been appointed to the board of studies for the first online degree course in Health Science that commenced in October 2009. He will also contribute a module to this course during 2010.

PODIATRY DIVISION

2008

- During 2008, members of staff and students of Podiatry Division were involved in different activities. This reflects the aim of the Division in continuing to establish and maintain high professional training standards, in its expansion of services and links within the local and also the European sphere.
- Ms Cynthia Formosa, Divisional Coordinator, together with members of staff from the Podiatry Division attended various seminars and conferences both locally and also abroad.
- This year was a very important one for the Podiatry division since it signed a bilateral agreement with the University of Staffordshire for further collaboration between both Universities in both teaching and research projects.
- At present three members of staff are in different stages of completion of their Ph.D. studies.
- In April 2008 Ms Cynthia Formosa published a paper in the Journal Diabetes and Primary Care entitled 'Influence of national culture on diabetes education in Malta: A case example.'
- The academic year was a busy one with three courses running. In July eleven students visited the University of Staffordshire for ten days. Students had the opportunity to visit NHS Podiatry clinics and also experienced podiatric surgery in the United Kingdom. They were also invited to visit a shoe and orthotic factory during their stay.

- June 8 BSc Podiatry Students and 2 Diploma to Degree students successfully completed the 1st BSc course in Podiatry offered by the University of Malta.
- July External examiner for the Podiatry Division, Prof. Kate Springett from Canterbury Christ Church University, was invited by the Association of Podiatrists, Malta to deliver a lecture on diagnostic ultrasound.
- October Dr Cynthia Formosa achieved Ph.D. from the University of Brighton, being the first Podiatrist to have achieved this degree in Malta.
- November Mr Bob Longworth, Visiting Lecturer, University of Staffordshire, delivered a CPD lecture to both Podiatrists and student podiatrists at the IHC during his visit to the university.
- December The Podiatry Division together with various partners including the University of Staffordshire have submitted a proposal under the FP7-ITN Marie Curie Action.
- Podiatry members of staff inside the IHC attended various other local conferences or CPD's organized by the Association of Podiatrists, Malta.

RADIOGRAPHY DIVISION



Coordinator: Dr Paul Bezzina, B.Sc.(Radiography)(Lond.), M.Sc.(Lond) Ph.D. (U.E.A.), C.T.Cert.

2008

- October 2008: The degree course in Health Science Radiography was offered and seventeen students registered for the course. This was the first time that entry into the Radiography course was limited by the number clause.
- Between January and April 2008, the Division, for the 12th consecutive year hosted 22 ERASMUS students from the Erasmus Radiography Group. These students came from Finland, Ireland, UK, and Portugal. Three other students from Sweden, Estonia and Denmark also took part in an ERASMUS exchange between March and July 2008. As in the previous year the course programme offered was integrated with the B Sc (Hons) Radiography course and all the credits were weighted in ECTS. As part of the exchange the students undertook clinical placements at various institutions such as Mater Dei and Boffa Hospitals. The students also undertook clinical experience in theatre imaging at St Philip's Hospital. A social and cultural programme was also organised in order to provide the students with an insight of Maltese history and culture.

At the end of the exchange the transcripts were presented to the students by the Director at a reception, which marked the end of the exchange. During the evaluation programme the students remarked very positively about their experience in Malta.

- In May a group of 13 Italian Students lead by Dott. Gioele Santucci Coordinatore del Corso di Laurea in Tecniche di Radiologia, Universita' degli Studi di Bologna visited the IHC for a clinical attachment of 2 weeks.
- The Radiography Division hosted other elective students as follows:

- 9 Glasgow Caledonian University, Scotland, and
- 1 Queen Margaret University
- Twelve from a total 14 students in the third year of their radiography course programme participated in an exchange programme as follows:
- INHolland University, Haarlem, The Netherlands 5 students
- University College Dublin, Ireland 2 students, and
- University of Ulster, Belfast, United Kingdom 5 students
- July/September 2008: A total of 16 students were successful and completed the degree course.
- The external examiner was Dr Alan Castle, from the University of Portsmouth. Dr Castle had previously visited the IHC before as a visiting lecturer. In his report Dr Castle commented about the high standards achieved by the Division.
- With the move to the new premises the Division took possession of the skills laboratories. These are equipped amongst others with a direct digital mobile X-ray and an ultrasound unit. These units will be used for student practice under the direct supervision of the academic radiography staff. The units will also be used for clinical assessments purposes.
- In September 2008 Dr P Bezzina, Mr F Zarb and Mr J Portelli attended the ERASMUS Group meeting which was hosted by University Campus Suffolk, Ipswich, UK in September. Further information about the group may be found on the website www.erasmus-rad-group.org
- Dr Paul Bezzina attended meetings for the HENRE II, Higher Education Network for Radiography Education. This project looks at Radiograph_j education in Europe with the aim of producing a document that provides guidelines for the uniformity in training across the EU. Dr Bezzina is also appointed as member on the management team of the network.
- In May 2008 the Division hosted a meeting for the EMPIMI project. The EMPIMI project is an EU funded project which is co-ordinated by INHOLLAND University, The Netherlands. The aim of the project is the setting up of a joint Master's course. Besides the co-ordinating University and the Division the other members of the project are London South Bank University and University of Cumbria, UK; University College Dublin, Ireland and Kaunas University, Lithuania
- Mr Francis Zarb registered as a Ph D student with University College Dublin. His field of study is 'Optimization of CT scanning parameters and their effect on image quality and patient dose'.

- Ms Connie Falzon and Mr Jonathan L Portelli were appointed as part-time Assistant Lecturers with the Division.
- Dr Carmel J. Caruana has been appointed chair of the Special Interest Group of the European Federation of Organizations for Medical Physics (www.efomp.org) called 'Biomedical physics education for the healthcare professions'. Biomedical physics educators teach in most faculties of medicine, dentistry, pharmacy and health sciences in Europe. The aim of the group is to ensure that biomedical physics curricula for the healthcare professions are in agreement with the learning needs of the healthcare professions.
- Dr Paul Bezzina was appointed as external examiner to the Radiography undergraduate course programme offered by University College Dublin, Ireland. He was also appointed as one of the external examiners for M Sc dissertations.


