Wond Environment Day Event BirdLife Malta protests against hunters' participation

BirdLife Malta participated together with several other environmental NGOs and Government Departments. This was an excellent chance to explain to the public our aims, achievements and ambitions. Moreover, houseplants were sold as a fund-raising activity called "*A Flower for Life*" which we are happy to announce was guite successful.

Unfortunately the "green" character of the event was marred by the presence of two hunting associations which were allowed to

take part as if they were real "conservationists". This was nothing but a provocation and could not pass unremarked and BirdLife duly protested publicly about the matter. Let's hope that this lapse is not indicative of the way that things will be in future.


Good will should be ta'en in part of payment . . . Scottish proverb



. . . . but money is usually preferred. Unfortunately, good intentions will not pay our bills. Lack of funds is the chronic bane of all voluntary societies and Birdlife is no exception. In order to solve at least part of the problem, BirdLife has joined forces with medEcology to set up *ALIVE*, a fund for bird protection. *ALIVE* intends to operate in both the local and the international scene: a series of appeals, initiatives and events are planned for the coming years.

The first activity - A Flower for Life - was sponsored by F.Zammit Nurseries and was held on the 5th of June (see above). The funds collected through *AL/VE* will be utilised for educational and conservational purposes such as the Dinja Waħda Environmental Awards, Project Millenium, the Environment Education Centre at is-Simar, and many others.





Last March, Klabb Huttaf started a new initiative to recruit members. Klabb Huttaf is the junior section of BirdLife and aims to foster and spread nature



appreciation among young people. Education is really the long-term solution to our environmental problems, which means that the club depends on having a large membership.

Four volunteers have been visiting primary schools regularly to encourage children to enroll in the club. They carry out an activity involving the children in a 'swallow migration' game, which introduces them to the rigours of a bird's life.

Started on a trial basis, the project has now taken off with the encouraging result of 330 new members enrolled in a very short time, bringing the total to 1600 Huttaf!

1922-1997 75 TEARS OF CONSERVATION

This June, BirdLife International celebrates its 75th anniversary. It started off in 1932 as the International Committee for Bird Preservation. The eleven founding members met in London with the aim of creating a network of conservation organizations. At that time, the two major issues were marine pollution and bird trade; unfortunately these are still of concern to conservationists.

On March 1st 1993 the ICBP transformed itself into a partnership of bird conservation societies and changed its name to Birdlife International.

BirdLife International is today represented in over 85 countries, including Malta, giving it a worldwide membership of more than 1.5 million individuals. The bird species known to science are now about 9700 of which at least 1000 are threatened with extinction. In an effort to halt the



with extinction. In an effort to halt the decline, Birdlife partners are pooling their expertise and their resources to be in a better position to tackle these threats.

BirdLife has lobbied successfully in international fora as well as with individual governments for better protection of birds and their environment. The identification of important bird areas, bird species action plans and the development of biodiversity conservation information system are some of the recent achievements of Birdlife.

Some of the pioneers who, in 1922, set up the International Committee for Bird Protection, later renamed BirdLife International Great news from the Għadira front !

The Planning Authority has finally approved the building of the new reception centre in the Ghadira Nature Reserve. Work has already started and, should funds be available, the new centre is expected to start functioning by next year.

Foresta 2000

Ever thought of giving nature a present? Right now, BirdLife is preparing to give a big present to nature for the year 2000 - a forest!

Thousands of years ago, our Islands were covered in oak forest. Unfortunately human influence has, through the centuries, reduced the countryside to a treeless landscape. That is why BirdLife has decided to take the initiative to green up the place: we're still looking for a suitable area for the forest.

Meanwhile about 250 oak tree seedlings have started the project as is-Simar nursery. This year, a few schools were involved in the seeding. Next year we go big, including our members!

The struggle to recover the ground lost through the 1997 changes in the Hunting Regulations is still going on, notwithstanding the official obstacles placed in our path. Our appeal to the Courts to stop the slaughter of birds was refused and, to add injury to insult, we were fined LM40 for our efforts.

The situation today is that we have asked that an Authority of Review be set up to examine the new Regulations. Although the law states that the Government has to set up the Authority within 30 days of such a request, more than two months have passed at the time of writing and our application has been ignored. Our various reminders have finally been answered by the Prime Minister who has promised that the Authority will be set up shortly.

tween 13.00 and 20.00 hrs. Entrance to the Simar reserve will be through the gate in front of the second birdwatching hide, while that at Ghadira will be through the main gate.

Shearwater watching

Most of us are accustomed to seeing birds during the day. However some birds - such as the Cory's Shearwater - are active at night. About 8000 pairs are estimated to breed along the southern cliffs particularly at Hal Far and Ta⁴⁴⁴ Cenc; as they approach their nesting colony under cover of darkness they wail their eerie call.

Due to their nocturnal habits and inaccessible breeding sites, the shearwaters have survived the onslaught of hunters but they face other perils, including disturbance from development, fishing activity and sea pollution.

An evening with the shearwaters will be held in late July. Members present will be assisted by volunteers to spot these birds through telescopes. If you have a pair of binoculars, however, do bring them along and it is also advisable to carry some insect repellent and a light jacket. Since this activity will take place close to sea cliffs, it is advisable not to bring small children along with you.
