# Tuna-penning

The Ta' Cenc seabird colonies have been once again reprieved. The proposal to set up a tuna-penning station just off the cliffs is to be changed so that the fish cages will be placed several kilometres off the Ghadira coast and will not interfere so much with the shearwaters and petrels that still breed in Gozo. This decision was taken in view of the reluctance of the Planning

Gozo airstrip

Before the last elections, the Secretary of the Nationalist Party had solemnly informed BirdLife that the project to build an airstrip in Gozo had been definitely shelved. It was therefore with surprise and dismay that we recently learnt of the possibility that this project might soon be revived. Although nothing

is yet official, it seems that there is a lobby group seeking to pressure Government into enlarging the existing heliport to make it suitable for fixed-wing aircraft to use.


Surely, some alternative form of transportation could be devised.



# Hope for Buskett

The Buskett Gardens are one of the most important bird areas on the Maltese islands. This is the only sizeable woodland and is crucial for many migratory birds – especially raptors – who find refuge and roosting places among the mature trees.

Unfortunately the whole area is rather unkempt and suffering from over-use by

picnickers and lack of proper maintenance. BirdLife has long been asking for a body of wardens to, at least keep Buskett from degenerating further. It is with pleasure that we now see the

Planning Authority issuing a conservation order for Buskett and calling for the appointment of a specialised team to restore, rehabilitate, conserve and maintain the site.




The Cage

An original display, known as an installation, will be on show at the Museum of Fine Arts, Valletta from the 2<sup>nd</sup> to the 27<sup>th</sup> of March 2000. This installation, called The Cage is the work of US-Maltese artist David Camilleri and represents the plight of birds confined cages. It consist of a two-hour video

in cages. It consist of a two-hour video of a man who has spent 24 hours living in a "bird-cage" and who speaks about his ordeal and the stress that such a condition causes him. The dramatic reversal of roles that this installation portrays is brought into focus by the fact that the both birdsong and a human voice are heard but while the human speech is coming from inside the cage, the bird "speech" is outside the metal bars.

This installation may be viewed during the opening hours of the Museum, daily (including weekends) from 8.30 am to 4.30 pm (4.00pm during weekends).




# **Egyptian Misadventures**

Once again, the hunting escapades of our fellow Maltese in Egypt have made the headlines. A number of hunters - at least five - who travelled to Egypt with an agency well-known for its amateur safaris along the Nile have been arrested in Egypt and taken to court on charges that they had killed several protected birds. These men were later allowed to return to Malta on condition that they go back to Egypt when their case is bound to be heard in Court.

One hopes that, this time, the Maltese authorities will be more alert and cooperate with their Egyptian counterparts. We all remember the case of the Zebbug trader who was supposed to go to the UK to face charges of trafficking in protected finches and how this person managed to elude justice.

In any case the Government of Egypt deserves praise for the effort it is putting in protecting the wildlife heritage of its country and BirdLife has written to the Egyptian ambassador in Malta to convey its congratulations.



#### **Exotic bird at Ghadira**

The Ghadira reserve hosted a distinguished Russian visitor early on February . This bird - the dusky warbler - breeds in Siberia and is an extremely rare species in the Mediterranean. It superficially resembles a common chaffinch at this time of the year but can be distinguise hd from the latter by its darker colour and its call.

Other birds that were observed in Ghadira these last couple of months included coots, black-necked grebes and moorhens as well as various ducks: teals, shelduck and shovellers.

## Bird smuggling

Several dead birds - including woodpeckers - and a racoon have been intercepted as they were being smuggled into Malta from the USA. The Customs Officers who managed to spot these birds and arrest the smuggler deserve our full praise and encouragement.


Lunch is available at Lm 5 per person and members intending to stay for lunch are requested to book at least a week in advance. Bookings can be made at the BirdLife offices.
