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Collections at the Junior College Library

The Junior College (JC) Library is made up of five collections: the Main, Reference, Short Loans, Fiction and Biographies and Melitensia.

The **Main Collection** houses books pertaining to all subjects taught at this College. History, geography, management, accountancy, chemistry, biology and mathematics are some of subjects included in this section. Books from this section **can be borrowed** for a period of three weeks.

The **Reference Collection** includes encyclopaedias, dictionaries, thesauri and atlases. *Reference works provide* specific, detailed information or definitions on general or specialized topics. Reference works cannot be checked out of the Library premises so as to ensure their constant availability. Reference books can be identified by a yellow label on the spine.

The **Short Loans Collection** is located behind the Circulation Desk. The section contains textbooks which are in high demand. Short loan books may be borrowed for **use inside the Library premises** and issued solely on presentation of the Smart card/student card. All books in the Short Loans Collection are identified by a pink label.

The **Fiction and Biographies Section** contains works of fiction in a number of genres as well as biographical works. The publications can be identified by an orange label and a white label respectively and can be borrowed for a period of three weeks.

The **Melitensia Collection** comprises works written by Maltese authors, as well as publications related to Malta and authored by foreign writers. Books vary from history to geography and from culture to literature. The section also houses reference works such as Maltese dictionaries, as well as encyclopaedias and biographies. Melitensia reference works cannot be checked out of the Library. Melitensia publications are colour-coded with a blue label.



David Beckham: My Side (2004)



The Star of Bethlehem

Myth? Fact?

Without doubt, one of the most prevalent symbols of Christmas is the Star of Bethlehem. According to Christian tradition, the star led the Magi to Bethlehem, the place where Jesus Christ was born. The star is only mentioned in the gospel of Matthew:

Now after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea in the days of Herod the king, behold, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, saying, Where is He who has been born King of the Jews? For we have seen His star in the East [or at its rising^[11]] and have come to worship Him." [Matthew 2:1–4 New King James Version (1982).]

There have been many different explanations of what the Star might have been, ranging from pious fiction to some sort of astronomical phenomena. It is very likely though that it was truly an astronomical event. Several theories have been put forward. Some have suggested that it was a comet or a supernova, but the most likely explanation is that it was a planetary conjunction.

In the year 2 B.C. the two brightest planets, Jupiter and Venus, approached each other so closely that no human eye could separate them.

In Babylonian myth, Jupiter was the planet associated with kings while Venus was the herald of dawn. A conjunction of these two planets occurred close to the bright star Regulus (meaning king), in between the feet of the constellation Leo (the Lion), an ancient Jewish symbol. This combination of events can be interpreted as suggesting that a King has been born in Israel heralding hope and light.

The event occurred on Tuesday, 17th June 2 B.C. On that day, the 'Star of Bethlehem' appeared above the western horizon as seen from Palestine.

Research Tip

Start, don't end, with Wikipedia

Wikipedia is a great place to start your research — spend some time searching for keywords related to your topic, browsing the links you find on each page, and following their suggested resources.

Take notes, especially of any good sources they recommend.

The goal here is to get a good overview of the subject you're writing about, and Wikipedia is far better for that thanmost print sources, because of its hyperlinked nature. By the time you get ready to write, though, you should have much better sources at your command than Wikipedia, so avoid citing it in your assignment.
