

NOTICE.

Discontinuance of use at Malta of Postage Stamps of the United Kingdom.

NOTICE is hereby given that, on and from the 1st. January 1885, postage stamps of the United Kingdom will be USELESS for the prepayment of postage on correspondence posted in Malta or Gozo, and that all letters, etc. bearing Imperial Stamps posted after the 31st. December 1884, will be treated as UNPAID and charged on delivery.

Malta postage stamps, to be used on and from the 1st. of January, may be purchased at the General Post Office, Valletta, on and after the 27th of December.

Imperial postage stamps, if unused, clean, and in saleable condition, will be purchased at the General Post Office up to the 24th of December, inclusive, at par; but, between that date and the 31st of December, a charge will be made of the commission indicated at page 16 of the current edition of the Imperial Post Office Guide.

Official Correspondence between The Malta Post Master, Roger Duke - The Chief Secretary - The Crown Agents - and Messrs De La Rue, which led to the issue of the 1st Definitive Malta Queen Victoria issue on 1st January 1885.

Post Master - Roger Duke, to Chief Secretary.

General Post Office,

Sir,

I think it right to annex for the information of H. E. the Governor particulars of the sale of postage stamps of the United Kingdom at this Office during the financial year ended in March last as a guide to the Island Government in regard to the approximate quantities of the several denominations of stamps which will have to be provided for use after the Transfer. To these quantities must be added say 1000 stamps of each denomination for distribution among the countries of the General Postal Union, through the International Bureau at Berne, and for sale to collectors; and in estimating the $\frac{1}{2}$ stamps required, it will be necessary to add together the sales of Imperial and Island $\frac{1}{2}$ stamps respectively.

I am inclined to doubt any present necessity for the issue of $\frac{3}{4}$ stamps, these having heretofore been sold chiefly to be sent as remittances, so that the denominations required would be $\frac{1}{2}$, 1^d, 2^d, 2^d, 4^d, 5^d, 6^d, and 7^d together with registration envelopes of two sizes, 1^o (single) and 2^o (copy) Post-Cards, and $\frac{1}{2}$ ^o and 1^o newspaper wrappers. I presume that the new Malta postage stamps would be ordered

through the Crown Agents for the Colonies; and so I was verbally informed by the Crown Agents in London last year that their manufacturer, Messrs De La Rue, made a considerable reduction in the price when 500 sheets or upwards were printed, viz

For less than 500 sheets -	1/4 p.	1000 stamps
For 500 sheets or upwards	10	" "

there might be some advantage, apart from the saving in dies, in not issuing 5^o or 6^o stamps in the first instance; but in estimating the quantities required, to add to the 2^{1/2} stamps to be ordered, double the computed sale of 5^o stamps, and to add to the 2^o and 4^o stamps respectively the amount of the computed sale of 6^o stamps. It need scarcely be added that even 10 p. 100 is a much higher charge than the cost of printing stamps, in still larger quantities at the Inland Revenue.

I may add that it is desirable that the new stamps should not too nearly resemble those of the United Kingdom and that the colour of each denomination should differ from that of the corresponding Imperial stamp. If in the new stamp the Royal effigy could be projected upon the eight pointed Maltese Cross, a distinction would be effected which might not

perhaps be wholly unpopular in the Islands

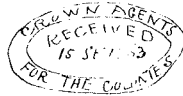

With reference to your letter of the 31st July last, with which you submitted to us a $\frac{1}{2}$ Malta Postage Stamp of the colour established by the International Postal Convention for that duty, I now forward for your information a letter we have received from the Colonial Government covering a copy of a report furnished by the Postmaster of Malta, giving the quantities of Postage Stamps, Post Cards, and Registration Envelopes which it is estimated will be required after the transfer of the Post Office to the Island Government, and have to request that you will

furnish us with designs, an estimate of the cost of the necessary dies, Key plate and over-print formes together with that of producing the articles enumerated in the correspondence.

Your estimate should also embrace the price to be charged for over-print plates for producing a series of Revenue Stamps from the Postage Key Plate, and of the cost of printing.

In selecting the colours of the Stamps, you will of course adopt for the $\frac{1}{2}$, 1 and $2\frac{1}{2}$ duties, those established by the International Postal Convention.

We herewith beg to return the correspondence from the Government of Malta, covered by your letter of the 17th inst., and to enclose three designs which we have prepared for Postage Stamps, together with one for the proposed Registration Envelope Stamp, and two for the proposed 1st Single and Reply International Post-cards.

It appears from the correspondence that in the first instance at least the Postage Stamps are to be limited to the following six rates, $\frac{1}{2}$ ^d, 1^d, 2^d, 2½^d, 4^d, 7½^d. A printing plate is in existence here for the $\frac{1}{2}$ ^d stamps, so that it becomes necessary to provide only, for producing five denominations. The design marked A is for a key-stamp, the duty being inserted by a second or over-printing. The two other designs, viz. those for the 1^d and 2½^d stamps, are for stamps printed in one operation like the $\frac{1}{2}$ ^d duty. It appears to us that considering the quantity of stamps which is used annually of these two denominations, it would be cheaper to provide for them a full-sized printing plate rather than that they should be produced by the somewhat expensive process of being printed and overprinted from small plates. The other duties, being used in but small quantities, might, however, well be produced by that system. As requested;

we have in all three designs introduced the Maltese cross as an element of ornament, but it must be understood that the designs are simply hand drawings, and but they roughly represent the effect of finished engravings.

Our prices would be as under:-

The Key die and the 1^d and 2^d dies £50 each

Printing plate of 240 multiples struck from the 1^d and from the 2^d die £85 each.

• A printing plate of 120 multiples struck from the Key die £42. 10. 0.

Each printing plate of 60 multiples for overprinting the duty in the Key stamps £12.

• A printing plate for overprinting the words "Revenue" £12.

1^d or 2^d Postage Stamps printed from the full sized form - When a ream or more than a ream of any duty are supplied at a time 10^d per thousand.

When less than a ream d^o 5^d d^o

For overprinting the stamps with the word "Revenue", an additional charge of 3^d per thousand would have to be made.

Stamps printed from the Key plate and overprinted with the duty - When a ream or more than a ream of any duty are supplied at a time 5^d per thousand
When less than a ream d^o 3^d d^o

The cost of overprinting the word "Revenue" on these stamps would be 4^d per thousand.

We should here remark that the Postage Stamps are printed in singly fugitive inks, and that

such inks are not suitable for Revenue Stamps provided those stamps have to be cancelled by writing inks, and the only safe ink to employ for stamps which have to be so cancelled is our doubly fugitive purple, the properties of which are fully explained in the pamphlet we herewith beg to enclose.

The prices quoted above would have to be augmented by 3^d. per thousand should the stamps be required printed in doubly fugitive ink.

On the appendix hereto we give a Scheme of the colours which we should propose for the Maltese Postage Stamps. The specimen of the 1/2^d. stamp is printed from its proper plate. For the other colours, we give specimens of the Antigua 1/2^d. Postage Stamps.

With regard to the Registration Envelopes, we presume that the stamp for denoting the Registration Fee is to be of the value of 2^d., and we have prepared our design accordingly. The cost of the necessary hardened steel die for impressing these stamps would be £38, and the following Scale of Prices would obtain for the Envelopes themselves:

In designing the Post Cards we have followed the regulations laid down by the International Postal Convention and we have assumed that the Reply Card is to be of the 1^o rate, making for both sides a total duty of 2^d.. The price of the little printing plate by which the small annual quantity

of 1st International Reply Post Cards would be printed by hand would be £3, and the price of the cards as under:-

Of the 1st International Single Post Cards it appears that some 26,000 are used annually, so that it would be well to make a half size printing plate and print them by machine. The cost of such a plate would be £15 and of the cards in lots of not less than 25,000, 8/6 per thousand

We remark that in Mr. Roger Duke's letter allusion is made to Newspaper Wrappers of the rates of 2^d and 1^d, but they are not referred to in the Appendix to that letter, so that we are hardly in a position to estimate for the supply of the Wrappers in question, seeing that we have nothing before us to show the probable annual consumption. It would be important for these particulars to be given, large quantities being produced in a different manner to small quantities; and in view of the fact that the supplies for the Postal Service of Malta have hitherto been drawn from the London General Post Office, we have been very anxious to arrive at the cheapest mode of production for the proposed new Stamps, Cards and Envelopes. It is, however, impossible, even working on the most economical method, ^{that} the comparatively small quantities which

are required of each article should not cost considerably more than they have hitherto done, seeing the enormous scale upon which the manufactures are conducted by us for the home Government.

We trust to hear in due course that our designs meet with approval.

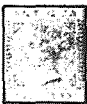

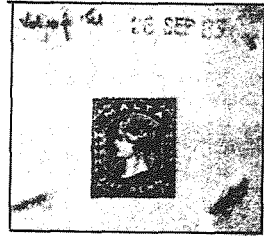

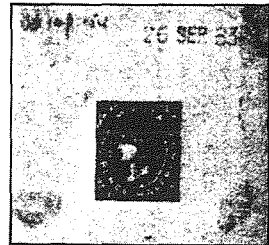
*Malta Postage Stamps

Colours established by the International Postal Convention for these two duties

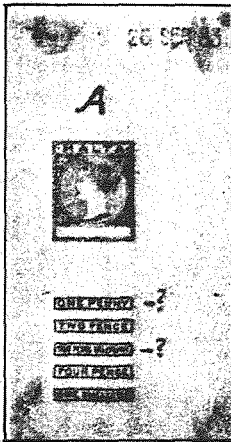


Colours established by the International Postal Convention for this duty.

QUEEN VICTORIA REGISTERED ENVELOPES 2d

In the MALTA GOV GAZETTE No. 3063, of Wednesday 31st December 1884, Supplement, section 17, we find the foll notice. "Postal Packets may be Registered, and for each letter or packet so registered a fee of TWO pence shall be paid in addition to any rate payable under this Ordinance."

The first printings of these Postal Registered Packets were contracted out to Mc Corquodale who printed the envelope., while De La Rue applied the Embossed Value Medallion, and then invoiced the completed work to the Crown Agents. These Reg Envelopes came in Two sizes (G. 152 x 96mm), and (H 202 x 127mm). Because of the printing of these envelopes in two separete operations, there is a variation in colour between the Value Medallion, and the Instructional text. A simple way to identify the work of either printer is to look at the sealing flap pattern; The Mc Corquodale is triangular (fig 1) whereas the De La Rue is rounded (fig 2).

There are 17 printings of the "G" size, total 283,130 plus 100 Specimen; and 13 printings of the "H" size, total 34,925 plus 100 Specimen.

The Original drawing of the Embossed Medallion in Blue on thin paper dated 26Sep83 is illustrated in Page 14 of the Official Correspondence. A Die Proof in Vermilion is also known to exist. The First supply was invoiced on 5 JULY 1884 (p. 40)

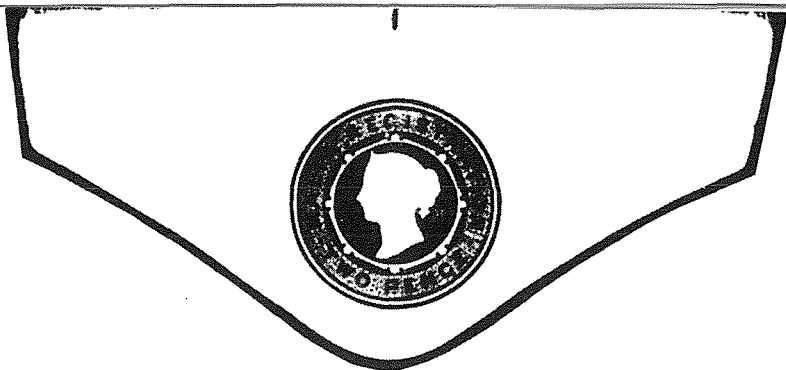

QUEEN VICTORIA POST CARDS & REPLY CARDS 139 x 89mm

Post Cards and Reply Cards were designed by Messrs De La Rue (p. 14); "Following the regulations laid down by the International Postal Convention, assuming that the reply card is to be of the 1d rate, making for both sides a total duty of 2d" (p. 12)

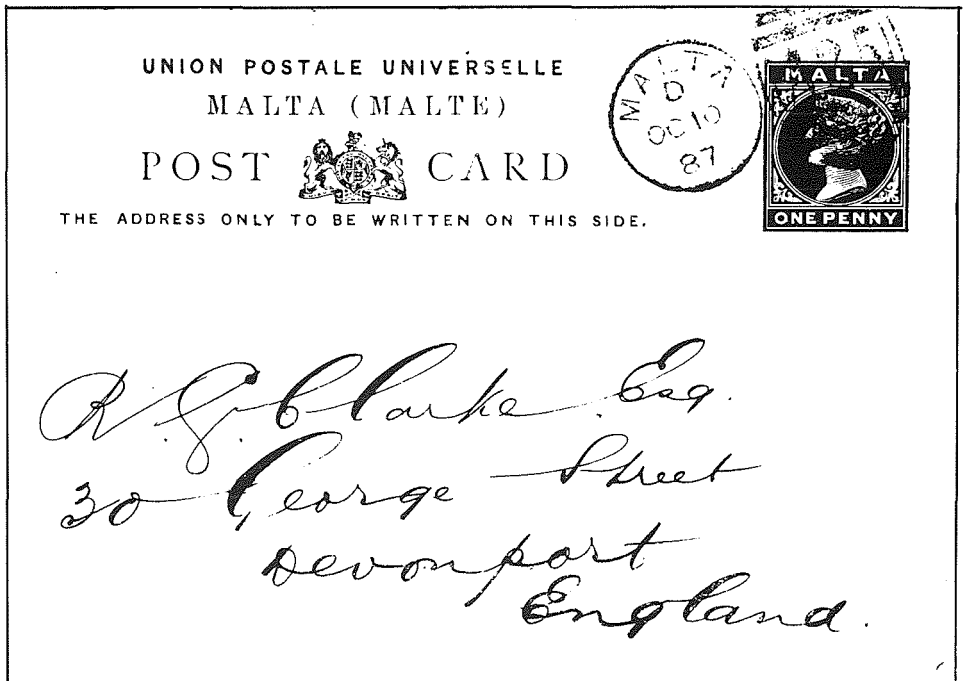
PROOFS. Original Artist's sketch for 1d postcard dated 19 Jan 83, and an essay with registered pencil sketches of the key plate 1d dated 26 Sep 83 exist.

PRINTINGS. Sixteen printings of the 1d single card are recorded. The invoiced total quantities are 903,528 plus 100 overprinted Specimen. There were Seven Printings of the 1d + 1d reply cards, totaling 22,002 plus 100 overprinted Specimen. The earlier printings are Carmine on soft white card, later reprints are varying from shades of Carmine. The Card ranges in colour from Pale to Dark Brown Buff.

On the 14th Jan 1901 Queen Victoria ½d Single Postcard and ½d + ½d reply cards were issued (121 x 79mm) in Green on Buff card.

PROOFS. A proof of the ½d Key plate Post Card endorsed "Appd M.W.C. 30.6.00" is known.

PRINTINGS. Only one printing of each type of ½d card is recorded. The Invoiced No. printed of the ½d single was 48,696 plus 722 Specimen; and ½d + ½d reply cards 3144 plus 722 Specimen.

These wrappers were Invoiced on the 15th July 1885 a rather late supply because of the fact that the original request was for the ½d stamp to be impressed from the existing adhesive of the same value, but Messrs De La Rue did not want to print from that die as the engraving was "too fine to reproduce well on coarse wrapper paper." Designs were submitted for the ½d green and 1d carmine key plate designs, completely hand painted on proof paper wrappers, dated 2nd Oct 1883, but were rejected by the Postal Authorities as they lacked the Maltese Cross, so a modified design of a ½d green incorporating the demand (dated 4th May 85), was submitted and accepted on 9th May 1885. The 1d wrapper was never produced.

PRINTINGS. Two printings are recorded totaling 100,550 plus 105 Specimen.

When opened out the wrapper measures 125 x 300mm.

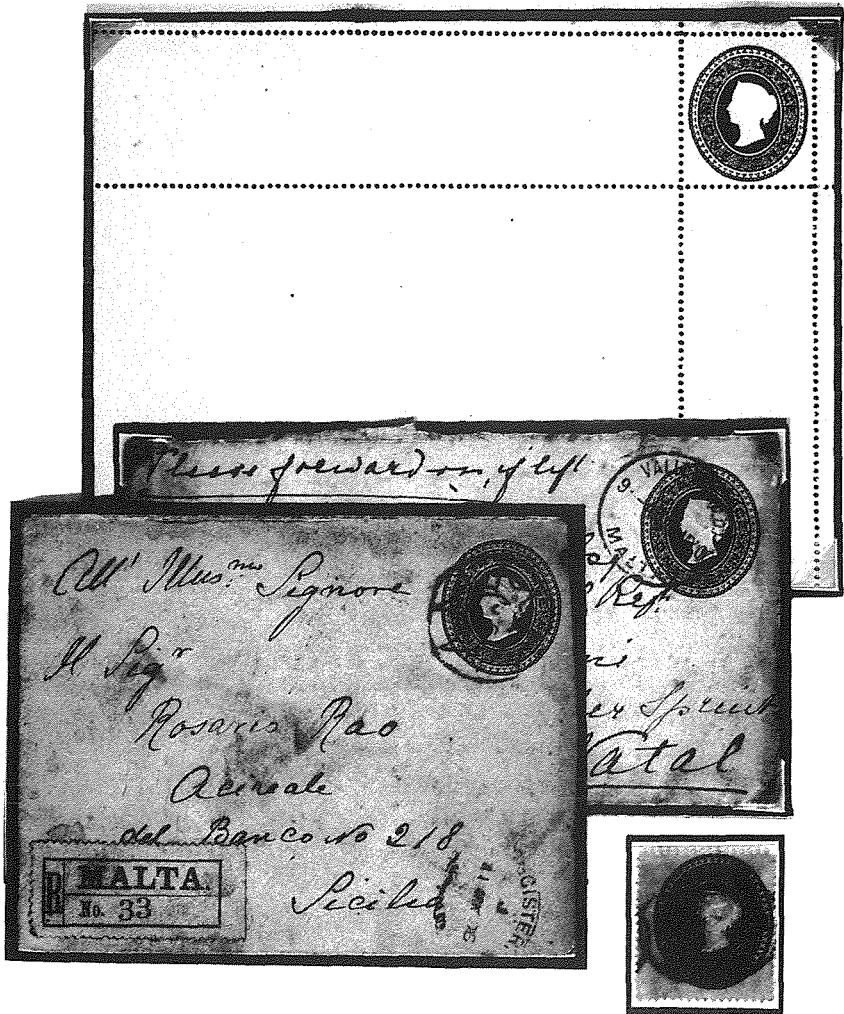

QUEEN VICTORIA POST PAID ENVELOPES

POST PAID ENVELOPES with an embossed ONE PENNY stamp design, were printed by Messrs De La Rue, and issued on 1st May 1900. A hand painted oval to the embossed head in red and lake is known dated July 12/99. There were three sizes. (120 x 94mm); (140 x 78mm); (158 x 123mm) and were sold either singly, or in packets of 24 in accordance with the following tariff: 1...1¼d; 2...2¼d; 3...3¾d; 4...4¾d; 6...6¾d; 9...8¾d; 12...1s1d; 24...2s2d; but as these envelopes were never widely accepted by the public, they were sold at face value from the 1st Sep 1904. Later, another regulation allowed the cutting and use of the stamp design.

“It is hereby notified that on and after the 10th instant (10 Oct 1906) embossed or impressed stamps cut out of envelopes, postcards, or wrappers may be used in payment of both local and foreign postage. However cut outs from Registered envelopes could only be used for Registered Mail.



ARTIST'S DRAWINGS - KEY and DIE PROOFS.

The design for the 1885 Queen Victoria Definitive Issue were designed by J.F. Joubert de la Ferte, and Printed by Messrs De La Rue & Co.

The design of the head for the ½d., known as the "First General Colonial," having a diadem with a "Cross, fleus de lys and shamrock" was prepared in March 1859, and used by various colonies. Malta accepted it for its first ½d yellow (1860 - 1884) and later used it for this issue.

In July 1862 Joubert produced the head, described as "ball, thistle, ball, shamrock" diadem which was used for the remaining Malta denominations, as well as by other colonies.

Because the Definitive Issue consisted mainly of Queen Victoria's head, it became popularly known among collectors as the Victoria "HEADS" set, so the plate of the 1860-84 ½d yellow stamp was issued to print the ½d Green, and a Key plate used for the 2d, 4d, and 1/-, with new individual designs for the 1d and 2½d values (page 29).

All six were engraved and printed from electrotype plates on paper with single Crown CA watermark and perforated 14 Comb. This original Artist's hand drawing dated 26 Sep 83 of the Key Plate design marked A was eventually used for the 2d, 4d and 1/- values, and the other original artist's proof, both in deep Magenta also dated 26 Sep 83 (page 29) show the profound key plate design, with a blank area for the denominations. Beneath are five denomination inscriptions "ONE PENNY", "TWO PENCE HALF-PENNY," and "ONE SHILLING". One proof also shows the Maltese Cross design and is initialled EER, which was introduced as "an element of ornament." (Letter of 20 Sep 83 Messrs De La Rue to Crown Agents).

The Artist's drawing marked A has a question mark next to "ONE PENNY" and "TWO PENCE HALFPENNY" whilst the other has these two crossed out. The main reason being that the original idea must have been to have this design for all values, but since separate designs were desired for the "ONE PENNY" and "TWO PENCE HALFPENNY" (page 29) these values were crossed out and independent designs for these two values submitted (page 29).

DIE PROOFS

The KEY PLATE for the 2d, 4d, 1/- are in black on glazed cards and have been recorded with the following inscriptions:

1. Key-plate designs without value, cut down to about 1mm margin.
2. A similar proof but dated 6/3/84 on reverse and another dated 8/3/84.
3. On glazed card: marked "BEFORE HARDENING" dated 18 FEB 84.
4. On glazed card: marked "AFTER HARDENING" dated 19 FEB 84.
5. On glazed card: marked "AFTER STRIKING" dated 11 MAR 84.
(initialled G.M.)

DIE PROOFS of 1d.

1. 1d in black on glazed card cut down to size of stamp.
2. 1d in black on glazed card without the value.

3. 1d, in black on glazed card Unmarked.
4. 1d, in black on glazed card dated 5 MARCH. "AFTER HARDENING" and initialled "G.N." or "G.M."
5. 1d in black on glazed card dated 11 MAR 84 "AFTER STRIKING".
6. The 1d and 2½d die proofs in black on glazed card with 1 to 1.5mm margins exist mounted on the same card, struck on the 12th March 1884 respectively. It is also known in black on glazed card dated on reverse "7.3.84".

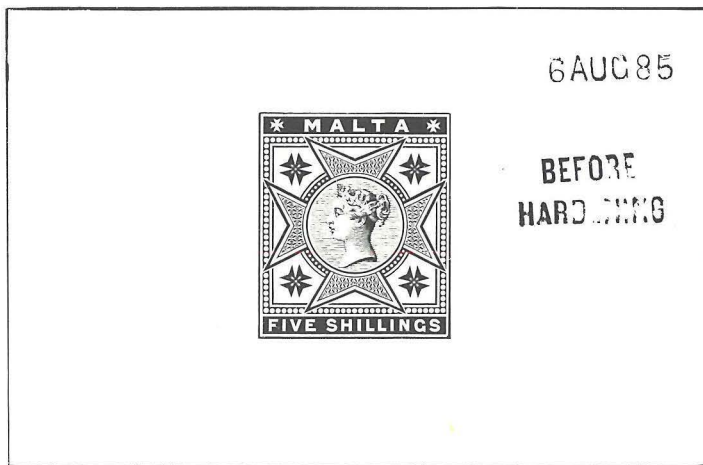

Hand Stamps Used in the Victoria Period:

In 1885 the only Post Office was the Valleta G.P.O. and the single 20mm ring with arched MALTA having code letters A to R was used on internal mail. This ring handstamp was also used combined with the A25 killer.

The mail was delivered by contractors to the villages where it was placed in the notice board of the Police Station for eventual collection.

Later on in 1885 Two Post Offices were opened in Gozo. One at Rabato whose name was in 1887 changed to Victoria, and the other at Migiarrò. I find it rather odd that the authorities opened up two Post Offices in Gozo when there was only one in the whole of Malta. The population in Gozo during this period was very much smaller than that in Malta.

Branch Offices were opened later in Malta as follows:-

Cospicua - opened in 1890

Sliema - opened in 1895.

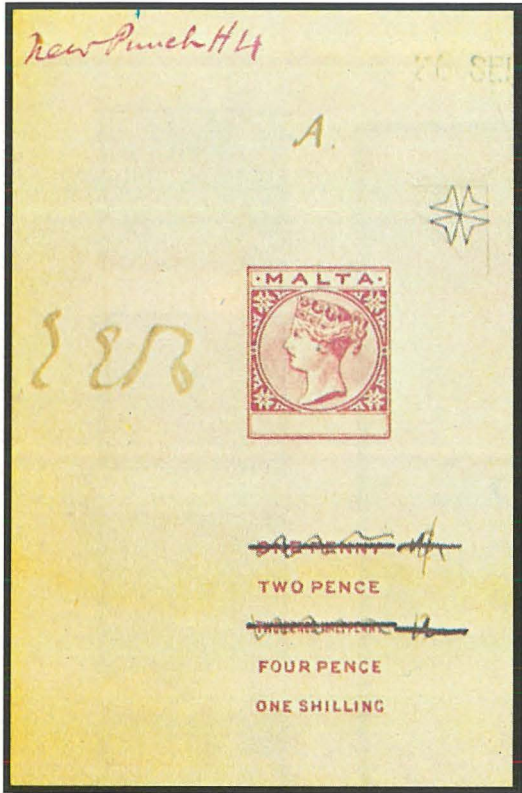
Notabile - opened in 1897.

Birchircara - opened in 1898 - closed in 1899.

Mellieha - opened in 1902 - closed in 1903.

The system of employing mail contractors to carry local mail was ended in 1893. On the 10th July 1900 a series of circular datestamps were provided for cancelling mail from 28 of the villages.

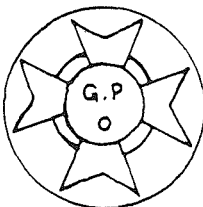
Single ring with "VALLETTA (C.O.) / MALTA" with time and date in one line. Diameter 29mm, used between 1897 and 1902.

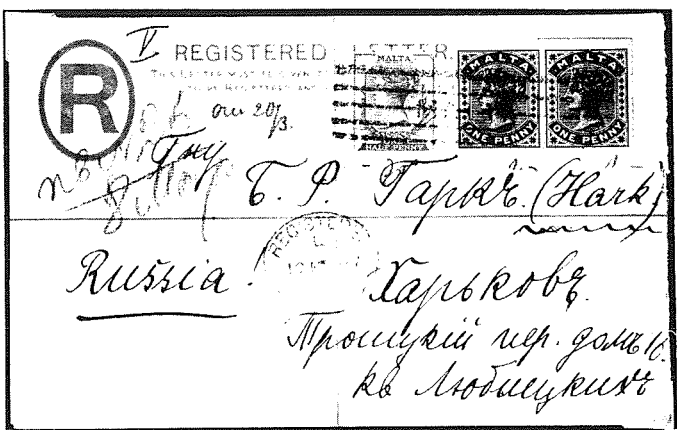

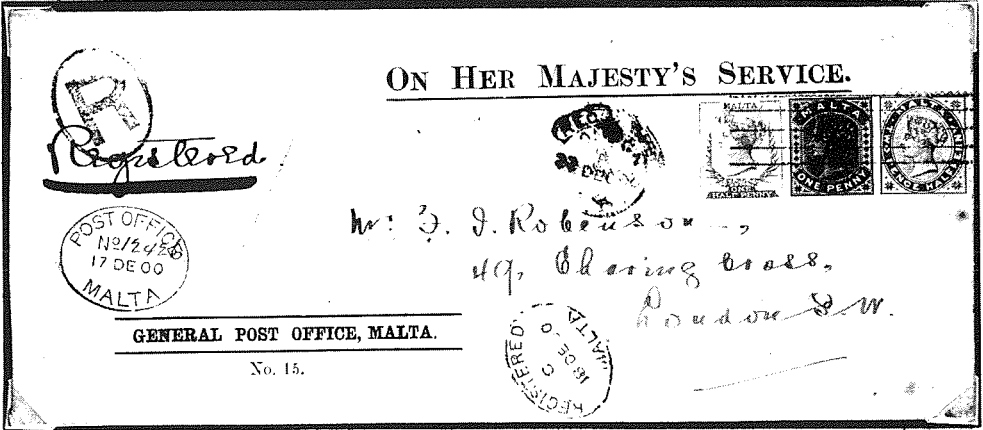

Taking 2 transfers from the original Colonial Queen's head Die highly finishing these transfers equal to the original die and engraving thereon the approved designs and lettering "Malta one Penny" and "Malta two pence halfpenny."

Taking a transfer as above and engraving thereon the word "Malta" and the approved design for the Postage Key Die.

Making from the above 1d and 2½d dies 2 Printing Plates of 240 Multiples.

Making from the above Key Die and Key Plates of 120 Multiples.

Making 3 overprint Plates of 60 Multiple each duties 2d, 4d, 1/-.

Making 2 Printing Plates for the Malta 1d International Single cards.

Making 2 Printing Plates for the Malta 1d International Reply Cards.

Taking a transfer from the original Colonial embossing Queen's Head and engraving upon the die thus obtained the approved design and lettering "Malta Registration Two Pence".

Striking from the die a punch from which to obtain the working die and highly finishing the working die equal to the original.

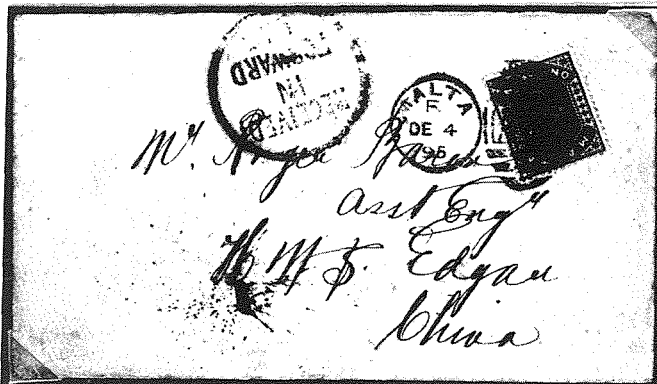

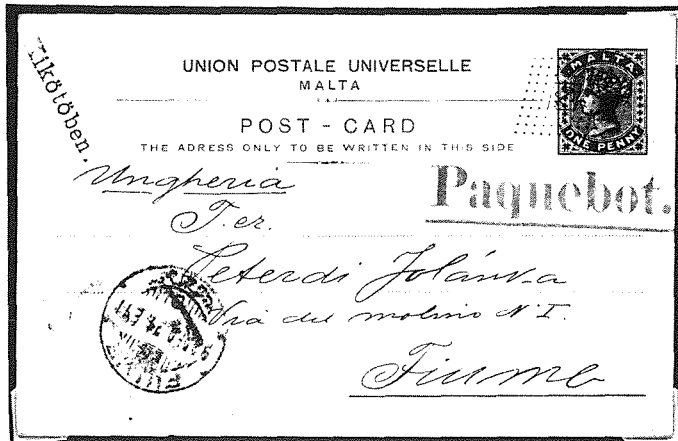


Cover to "H.M.S. EDGAR" in CHINA (1895)
