About the Author: Mrs. Lois L. Corbin was born in 1925 in Belleville, New Jersey, and started collecting stamps when she was 9 years old. After graduation from Skidmore University, New York, she taught speech and drama for three years, following which she spent several years working for two Indian Affairs establishments.

Mrs. Corbin became a librarian (she is an avid reader) and satisfied her dream. In 1970, she re-organized her collection on a thematic basis which now includes fine arts (of course), women on stamps, books, libraries and librarians on stamps, and religion.

In 1977 she took over as editor the "Masterwork" of the "FAP JOUR-NAL", not an easy task since it involves (in her own words) "four hours of filing and indexing to every hour written", but for a librarian this is a delightful work.
