**1. Translate the following passage into Latin:**

The prisoner was brought before the king, who asked him where he had concealed his money. To this the man replied that he had indeed been rich once, but that now all his money had been taken away from him by the soldiers, and that nothing was left. The king asked the soldiers if this was true, but they all declared that they had not taken the gold, and did not know where the prisoner kept it. Then the king said that he would discover by means of tortures who was telling the truth; but the prisoner, being overcome by fear, asked if the king would pardon him when the money was given up.

**1. Read the following passage carefully and then answer the questions set on it:**

iam primum omnium satis constat Troia capta in ceteros saevitum esse Troianos; duobus, Aeneae Antenorique, et vetusti iure hospitii et quia pacis reddendaque Helenae semper auctores fuerunt, omne ius belli Achivos abstinuisse; casibus deinde variis Antenorem cum multitudine Enetum, qui seditione ex Paphlagonia pulsi et sedes et ducem rege Pylaemene ad Troiam amissio quaerebant, venisse in intimum maris Hadriatici sinum, Euganeisque qui inter mare Alpesque incolebant, pulsis Enetos Troianosque eas tenuisse terras. et in quem primo egressi sunt locum Troia vocatur pagoque inde Troiano nomen est: gens universa Veneti appellati. **Aeneam** ab simili clade domo profugum, sed ad maiora rerum initia ducentibus fatis, primo in Macedoniam venisse, inde in Siciliam quaerentem sedes delatum, ab Sicilia classe ad Laurentem agrum **tenuisse**.

- Translate the last sentence: 'Aeneam ... tenuisse.'

**2. Read the following passage carefully and then answer the questions set on it:**

iam inde ab initio Faustulo spes fuerat regiam stirpem apud se educari; nam et expositos iussu regis infantes sciebat et tempus, quo ipse eos sustulisset ad id ipsum congruere; sed rem immaturam nisi aut per occasionem aut per necessitatem aperire noluerat. **necessitas** prior venit. Ita metu subactus Romulo rem aperit. forte et Numitori, cum in custodia Remum haberet audissetque geminos esse fratres, comparando et aetatem eorum et ipsam minime servilem indolem, tetigerat animum memoria nepotum; sciscitandoque eodem pervenit **ut haud procul esset quin Remum agnosceret**. Ita undique regi dolus nectitur. Romulus non cum globo iuvenum—nec enim erat ad vim apertam par — sed aliis alio itinere iussis certo tempore ad regiam venire pastoribus ad regem impetum facit; et a domo Numitoris alia comparata manu adiuvat Remus. ita regem obtruncat.

- d. How does the line 'Parcus deorum cultor et infrequens' (line 1) relate to Horace's attachment to Epicureanism?
- e. Name the meter of this poem and scan the first line.

- c. How do these men compare to Horace's contemporaries?
- d. Translate the last stanza, from 'damnosa quid... to vitiosorem'.
- e. In the beginning of the poem, Horace bemoans other signs of the degeneracy of his age. What are these signs?
