What are degrees with Psychology as an area of study?



- The aim of the programmes with Psychology as an area of study is to provide students with the opportunity to study psychology at a general level in combination with another related or unrelated area.
- These programmes include B.A. with Psychology as a main area of study, B.
 Communications, B.A. Theology and Human Studies, B. European Studies and B. Library, Information and Archives Studies.

What can one do with Psychology as an area of study?



 Such a degree provides openings in other disciplines besides Psychology, such as in education, helping and caring professions, management, human resources, media and communication, diplomacy, and research among others.

Do the B.Psy (Hons) and degrees with Psychology as an area of study have different programmes?



The B.Psy. (Hons) programme is an honours degree in Psychology making one eligible for postgraduate professional training in psychology



There is a **different programme** for the B.Psy. (Hons) and for students reading for a degree with Psychology as an area of study.



There are various core study-units which are open to both courses, such as PSY1610 Major Paradigms in Psychology, but there are other study-units in Psychology which are not available for students reading for a degree with Psychology as an area of study.

What does the degree with Psychology as an area of study consist of?

- Usually such degrees are spread over three years with students doing about 80 ECTS in Psychology.
- Students follow the core courses in Psychology such as Major Paradigms, Developmental Psychology, Social Psychology, and Psychopathology, together with the B.Psy. Hons students.
- In the third year they also do the Psychology Synoptics, where they integrate the various stands and core courses in Psychology through synoptic seminars and examinations.

ECTS (European Credit Transfer System) and study units

- 1 ECTS = 50 hours of work usually split into 5-7 hours of lecturing, with the rest spent on reading, studying, and working on assignments.
- Since each semester consists of 14 weeks,
 - A 2 ECTS study unit usually runs for one hour every week for a semester
 - A 4 ECTS study unit usually runs for 2 hours every week for a semester or 1 hour every week for a whole year
 - A 6 ECTS study unit usually runs of 3 hours every week for a semester or 1 hour a week in 1 semester and 2 hours in the other

ECTS and study units (continued)

Three hours of reading per one-hour lecture is the rule of thumb

Study Units are evaluated by examinations, assignments and participation, indicated in the course descriptions

The course description is an important source of info regarding what to expect from each study unit, including the aims and objectives, reading list, and method of assessment

It is up to the lecturer to choose the mode of assessment/s

Do I need Biology at Intermediate level to take Psychology as an area of study?



- No, Intermediate Biology is a prerequisite for the B.Psy. (Hons) only.
- However, students intending to continue studying Psychology, such as the Higher Diploma in Psychology (HDIP), will find Biology Intermediate very useful in their study.

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What if I would like to continue my studies in Psychology?

- The Department of Psychology now offers a **Higher Diploma** in **Psychology (HDIP)**, where students who read for a degree with Psychology as an area of study may enrol in an additional one full-time year at the Department provided that they have obtained at least category II in the final classification.
- During this year students take another 60 ECTS in Psychology including a dissertation and the compulsory study-units in the B.Psy. (Hons) which they would not have done in their first degree.
- The HDIP combined with the first degree is considered to be the equivalent of the B.Psy. and makes one eligible for professional training in Psychology.

In you intend to follow the HDIP in the future then please note that...

Study-unit PSY1617 Biological Psychology 1 is compulsory for those students who plan on following the Higher Diploma in Psychology.

Students intending to do the Higher Diploma in Psychology may take PSY1617 as an Optional study-unit from the 8 ECTS credits designated for the year instead of an elective study-unit (in the B.A. Psychology course) if they have an Intermediate Biology at grade C or better.

- If not, students are required to register for study-unit PSY1630 and then register for study-unit PSY1617 as an
 Elective during their second year.
 - * Study-unit PSY1617 is a pre-requisite for study-unit PSY1635 Cognitive Psychology.

Although students may register for study-units PSY1617 or PSY1630 as Optional study-units, other Optional Psychology units may not be taken concurrently.

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Important information regarding elective study-units (Year 1)

PSY1635 Major Paradigms: Cognitive Psychology is also **compulsory as a pre-requisite for the HDIP**. Therefore students who intend to follow the HDIP course need to take this study-unit in Year 1 SEM 2 or Year 2 SEM 2

 Study-unit PSY1617 Biological Psychology 1 is a pre-requisite for PSY1635

Important information regarding compulsory study-unit (Year 1)

 - PSY 1610 Major Paradigms in Psychology: Introduction to the Psychoanalytic and Humanistic Paradigms and Systemic Thinking
 - PSY1622 Developmental Psychology 1
 - PSY1315 Understanding Research in Psychology
- Semester 2:
 - PSY1623 Developmental Psychology 2

Requirement for regular progression to Year 2:

- 26 credits in Psychology
- •26 credits in the other area
- •8 credits in optional study-units

Can students

Yes, we had various students who did one semester in a university abroad and we strongly encourage all students to make use of this opportunity.

Students are advised to do the visit in the first semester of their second year.

It is important to contact the Psychology and Erasmus coordinators first to decide together which study-units to register for when abroad, keeping in mind compulsory Psychology study-units in year 2, semester 1.

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Information regarding some of the electives in Years 2 and 3

 Study-units PSY2628 Quantitative Research Methods and PSY2629 Qualitative Data Analysis are strongly recommended for those students who plan on following the HDIP. Students may take PSY2628 or PSY2629 as optional study-units during their second year and may not take any other optional study-units

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General Information



Students are to chose from the electives available in their respective programme of study; they may not select electives offered in the B.Psy (Hons) programme



Students may not register for Psychology study-units as optionals



Students who drop Psychology in their second year as a main area of study to the Honours in the other area of study are not eligible to read for the HDIP

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Student Representatives



- Students are asked to nominate **two** student representatives. These representatives will be asked to attend Board of Studies meetings and give feedback regarding the Psychology component of their studies.
