Department of Music Studies



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History

The Music Studies Department was set up in 1988 as one of the programmes of study within the Mediterranean Institute of the University of Malta. From the beginning, music students were encouraged to establish connections with the community through their involvement in concerts held both on campus and in other performing venues around Malta. Since then, the Department has trained students for a range of careers in music, including music education, professional orchestral performance, composition, studio production, and academic scholarship. In 2012, along with Dance Studies and Theatre Studies, the Music Department was integrated into the School of Performing Arts within the University of Malta, leading to staff members and students from all three Departments collaborating with each other across disciplines.

Opportunities in Music and Beyond

A degree in music is the key to a range of career opportunities. Teaching and performing are two of the most popular careers for those with a music degree. Other opportunities include jobs in the recording industry, in orchestral playing and management, freelance composing or performance, work in cultural management and administration, in the media and entertainment industries or in libraries and archives, to mention a few. In addition, a degree in music is often seen as an asset by employers seeking formal certification of professional training in creativity from prospective employees.

What We Do

Composition

The teaching of composition at undergraduate level is designed to encourage students to compose in diverse styles and media. The programme aims to help students learn to compose music that inspires and interests them without preference towards any particular 'house-style'. Teaching in this area is tailored to equip aspiring composers with proficient skills in the techniques of musical composition. Throughout their studies students are exposed to the application of computer technology and electronic music.

Postgraduate studies in composition lead students to create a professional portfolio of compositions, supervised by a tutor in regular one-to-one meetings. They are expected to develop a project with strong critical insights through practice-based research methods. All composition students have opportunities to hear their works presented in a variety of performance settings including collaborations with ensemble classes, visiting professional ensembles, and during workshops with the Malta Philharmonic Orchestra. Compositions by various members of staff are regularly performed by international ensembles, by the Malta Philharmonic Orchestra and various international orchestras of repute.

Musicology and Ethnomusicology

Specialist teaching is offered in musicology and ethnomusicology at both undergraduate and postgraduate levels, covering a wide variety of topics. Broadly viewed, both musicology and ethnomusicology are interested in the study of music in all its manifestations, by individuals and groups, at different times and places. Both disciplines are interested in key concepts such as aesthetics, identity, culture, theory, history, biography, genre and many more, with different methodologies adopted according to the particular research topic. Staff members in the Department have carried out research in various areas including among others: nineteenth-century instrumental and operatic music, new music and the avant-garde, Mediterranean music of the oral tradition, and Maltese popular music. Our research interests connect us to both local and international networks and institutions which support our research in diverse ways and which also provide opportunities for our students to carry out their research and related practice. Further assistance for research is provided by the University of Malta library facilities and performance spaces, as well as through collaborations between the UM School of Performing Arts and other musical institutions. Our research has been published by leading academic publishing houses including Routledge, Cambridge University Press and Boydell & Brewer, as well as in peer-reviewed scholarly journals. Moreover, Departmental staff members have contributed extensively to various musical reference works such as the New Grove Dictionary of Music and Musicians, Die Musik in Geschichte und Gegenwart, the Continuum Encyclopaedia of Popular Music of the World, the SAGE Encyclopaedia of Music and Culture, and Cambridge University Press Encyclopaedias.

Performance

For the third year of their study programme, music students have the option of choosing performance as their main area of study, although several study units offered in the first and second years are already aimed for students who plan to major in performance. This area is for students who wish to pursue a career as professional performers or, in the case of the B.Orch, orchestral musicians. Specialisation in performance, which will include regular individual sessions with professional tutors, is offered in piano, voice and a wide range of orchestral instruments. Students taking performance are trained in technique, aspects of interpretation related to different styles of music, and to deal with the issues of public performance, all of which are enhanced by the study of a varied repertoire encompassing solo pieces, chamber music and orchestral works. The undergraduate courses also include studies in basic conducting, as well as repertoire studies. Staff and students can participate in the Malta Philharmonic Orchestra's rehearsal sessions and concerts as observers, orchestra members, soloists in concertos, and conductors. Post-graduate students can also opt to focus on particular areas of performance, such as historically-informed performance or contemporary music.


Research Specialisations

Studying in Our Department

The Music Studies Department offers a range of Bachelor's programmes that match the particular interests and aspirations of students. During their first year, music students enrolled on a Bachelor's degree follow two areas of study – music studies and another subject chosen from an approved list of study areas. In the third year, students may opt to either continue following two areas of study for the BA, or concentrate on music studies for the BA (Hons). In 2017, prospective students will also have the possibility to enrol for the BMus (Hons), which will be a new undergraduate single honours degree programme entirely focused on music.

All our teaching and supervision is delivered in a dynamic environment that encourages mutual learning and a sense of community; moreover, it builds on a shared passion for music. Our teaching, which is all delivered in English, varies from class lectures to individual tuition, small group tutorials and departmental seminars. Students in our Department are encouraged to benefit from the diverse research interests of its academic staff members as well as from other academics within the School of Performing Arts. All students are also encouraged to participate actively in one or more of the ensembles supported by the Music Department, namely, the Vocal Ensemble, the String Ensemble, and the Wind Ensemble.

During the three-year study programme in music undergraduate students will follow a range of theoretical, historical and practical study units. In their final year, they will also be required to write a dissertation.

First- and second-year music students can follow study-units in the history of music, keyboard proficiency, music technology, musicianship, harmony, and singing, as well as practical tuition on their respective instrument (subject to availability).

In the third year of the course, students whose main area of study is music will have the opportunity to major in one of the three areas of specialisation offered by the Music Department, that is, composition, performance, musicology and ethnomusicology. Study units from the area of specialisation must be taken along with other build-up courses continuing from the first year, such as history and musicianship.



Postgraduate Study Programmes in Music

The Music Studies Department also offers postgraduate study programmes in composition, performance, historical musicology, and ethnomusicology at both master's and doctoral level. The research-based Master's programme leads to an M. Mus degree in one of the above areas. At doctoral level, we offer two degrees: (a) D. Mus in either composition or performance, and (b) Ph.D in musicology or ethnomusicology. International students with the relevant qualifications are welcome to apply; each application will be considered on its own merits.
