

Academic Report October 2015-September 2016

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Introduction

The University of Malta Cottonera Resource Centre (CRC) is a multidisciplinary community based lifelong learning and social support centre which adopts a systematic and multi-targeted approach to promote education in the South of Malta. The main objective of the CRC is to help facilitate and develop inter-generational involvement in life wide learning involving families, peer groups, the community, schools and university. The objective is to help promote leadership, self-awareness and active citizenship through the services provided.

The Centre was initially set up to explore the possibility of developing socially and culturally sensitive community engagement. To enable the CRC to do so it has to come up with outreach initiatives in the community, and it does so by setting up diverse sites for learning. These diverse sites eventually provide academics and university students with opportunities for developing socially- and culturally-sensitive academic, research, teaching and community projects. These community based projects can only take place through the constant collaboration with stakeholders at university, local and national level. Constant dialogue and cross agency cooperation is essential when it comes to facilitate access and retention of non-traditional learners in life wide education.

Services provided at the CRC are created and/or provided in the Cottonera and Kalkara area

- a. by university entities
- b. government entities
- c. non-government entities

The CRC is constantly conducting its formal and informal research to find out which services would be beneficial for different individuals and groups living in the South of Malta. When it cannot provide the services itself, it tries to rope in other departments/centres/institutes at university level or through government entities. CRC staff are constantly keeping themselves abreast with the educational needs of the communities and social groups in the area in which they are located and trying to find service providers who can provide the service to assuage this need. Non-government entities are also approached or their representatives approach CRC when they think they can be of benefit to the community.

Some services were created by the CRC with the funds allocated to it for this purpose. These consist of the Revision Classes and XjenzaMania. Providing these services entails recruiting personnel, training them, acquiring the necessary non-human resources while ensuring that the acquired part-time staff carry out their duties professionally. CRC has to find ways of generating funds to be in a position to acquire some of the resources needed for these projects, as in the case of the WeDo 2 kits.

When other university entities, government and non-government organizations provide the service, the role of the CRC is to promote the service at community level, organize the logistics, procure sometimes the educational resources needed and/or monitor the said service while constantly liaising with the service providers involved. All services have to be constantly promoted using various means, including the media, social media, and attending community outreach events.

The CRC gets a lot of help from various Cottonera Resource Centre board members. The board members do not only ensure that the CRC sticks to its remit, but come up with ideas which the CRC implements. Various board members are also involved in the implementation of certain services such as that of the legal clinic, counselling and adult education.

During this academic year the CRC board met 6 times in between November 2015 and August 2016. These meetings were held to discuss the remit of the CRC, bounce new projects/services and to assess how older ones were being implemented. One off meetings were also held with different board members who were involved in particular projects linked with the CRC. The board was also interested in facilitating the entry and retention of non-traditional students at university. For this purpose various meetings were held with stakeholders found on main campus to discuss what administrative changes might need to be enacted to persuade this cohort to pursue their education past the compulsory stage, and once they enter university facilitating the presence and retention.

This year the Director Dr Cutajar had the help of two Graduate Trainees - Ms Maria Fava (full-time) and Ms Pamela Vella Scicluna (on reduced hours). Ms Vella Scicluna resigned as of 19th August 2017.

In the following pages some feedback will be given on the different services or projects undertaken at the CRC. We will first start with the services organized and provided by the CRC which consisted of Revision Classes, *XjenzaMania*, *Kors fuq il-Familja* and *Il-Gimgha Mqaddsa*. This report will then move on to speak about the Counselling and Legal clinics. Four units provided by the University of the Third Age were also hosted at the CRC. The report will then discuss services provided by government and non-government entities.

Revision classes

One of the main projects organized by the CRC consist of Revision Classes. During such sessions the students have the opportunity to discuss any educational difficulties they have with their mentors and revise for their examinations. Their teachers are called mentors because their role is not only to teach the subject in which they specialize but to also help their students deal effectively with socio-emotional issues while giving career and vocational guidance. To facilitate this process, classes are kept small.

Before the start of the academic year, a call for part-time mentors was made through the Human Resources Department. Six mentors were selected to conduct revision sessions in Maltese, English, Mathematics and Physics to Form 4 students. An interviewing board met on the 7th of October to choose the mentors. The mentors met on the 15th and 19th October to learn what their duties were and what was expected of them. The CRC works with Form 4 students to help those students who might be struggling academically, and would therefore need some extra assistance to be able to successfully achieve their MATSEC O-levels.

The revision sessions were held on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday afternoon between 16.00 and 19.00, with sessions lasting one and a half hours each. The Form 4 students were divided into different classes according to their competence in the subject. The following table shows the subjects offered, and the number of students per mentor.

Furthermore, three volunteers gave one to one sessions to four students in care (aged 11, 12, 14, 15 years) in English and Maltese.

To find out whether this service has borne any fruit, students who had frequent Revision classes/Mentoring in the past were contacted. Not all could be reached since some had moved since 2013 and we did not have their present contact details. Others were not available at the time when this research was conducted. All in all 60 % of the cohort were contacted. This raw data given here will be updated every year and processed.

Pavlis Institute – Experiments


This year three Engineering undergraduates from the Michigan Tech University delivered a number of experiments during the physics revision sessions. The experiments permitted the Maltese students to learn through a hands-on approach and acted as a consolidation of the topics that were being tackled in class.

Experiment conducted:

- Electric Motor Demonstration
- Sound Wave Demonstration
- Basic Circuits Demonstration
- Catapult Physics Demonstration







Preparations for 2016-2017 are already underway. A meeting was held on the 19th September on how to plan the time-table for the next academic year, and promote it.

Legal Clinic

The legal clinic continued to operate at the Cottonera Resource Centre. Fifth year law students attending the Advocacy course provided by the Civil Law Department within the Faculty of Laws see clients as part of their practicum. The objective of this exercise serves to teach law students how to practice what they learn during their advocacy course. Students are confronted by real problem situations: they have to identify and solve the problem under the tutelage of their supervisors.

During the academic year 2015/2016 twelve law students participated in this project. The students were mainly placed into groups of two with each team taking on an average of three cases during the academic year. The centre was approached by 35 potential clients during the months of October 2015 and March 2016. A new virtual bookkeeping system was set up in order to organize the clients and allocate them to the teams as efficiently as possible. The Law Clinic was coordinated with the help of Dr. Kurt Scerri.

Legal Clinic appointments resumed during the month of July and August 2016. Three law students began to see new clients at the CRC. The students saw three cases, while two clients were still waiting for an appointment by the time this report was written. The legal clinic was mentioned in a report written by Clelia Bartoli (special issue May 2016) *Legal clinics in Europe*:

for a commitment of higher education in social justice after the director provided the necessary information to the researcher.

One needs to point out that the CRC helps in a number of ways in the success of this clinic. It actively promotes this service among service providers in the area using a number of methods to do so. Before the students start seeing clients, they are given some socio-economic details about the area, and the type of clients and issues that were dealt with by past students. Apart from processing calls, and working with the Civil Law Department co-ordinator to assign students to cases, the CRC is also involved in workshops where students discuss how effectively they dealt with different cases, and what they learnt from this practicuum.

A number of meetings have been conducted between IT Services, Civil Law Department, Department of Counselling and CRC to turn Room 5 into a laboratory where sessions between legal clinic/counselling students and clients can be audio-recorded to facilitate assessment and teaching. These meetings took place on the 9th of October, 29th March, and in the beginning of July.

XjenzaMania STEAM Summer Club 2016

The objective of this project is to promote STEAM, namely science, technology, engineering, arts, and mathematics among students aged 8 to 13 years, while building on skills and topics already covered in mainstream schools. A hands on approach was adopted in Integrated Science, Physics, Mathematics, English, Maltese, Chemistry, Biology, Design & Technology, Personal Development and ICT. A thematic approach was adopted - every week a different theme is adopted and taught through the different subjects. For further information on the raison d'etre behind XjenzaMania, please refer to the following article - XjenzaMania STEAM summer camp at the University of Malta Cottonera Resource Centre. ¹

There was an overwhelming demand for this project but only 65 students were accepted for a number of reasons. The CRC adopts a policy that in order to enable all students to engage with the subject, 15 or less students are to be assigned per class. This ensures that the mentors have the time to involve all students. Another reason why we could not take on more students was due to financial and space limitations. The students were divided into six classes according to age and sometimes competence. For the first time students with psycho-social difficulties were accepted.

Every class had three lesson per day of approximately one and a half hours each from Monday till Friday, with the exception of Thursday, where the students were taken on various outings that were organised by the staff members. These outings were linked with either a topic the students were covering in class, or were career oriented (see article mentioned above).

Authorized and unauthorized absentees were not included in the table above and in average attendance. The average attendance in the Xjenza Mania STEAM summer school was of 54 students per day.

Visit to XjenzaMania STEAM summer school by the Commissioner for Children

The Commissioner for Children, Ms Pauline Miceli, visited XjenzaMania held at the Cottonera Resource Centre. During this visit, Dr Cutajar, the director of the CRC explained the reason why this summer school promotes STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Mathematics) among 8 to 13 year old. Research demonstrates that during these years children start deciding which career paths to follow. This summer school was set up in Cottonera because a number of students had relatives who had at one point in time worked in the dockyard, and hence, without knowing, they might have picked up some technical and scientific knowledge through informal interactions. The school is building on this knowledge.²

Ms Miceli spoke to the students during assembly and underlined that they are the experts of what adults need to do to ensure that their rights are respected. She eventually visited all the classes and saw them at work during ICT, Design and Technology, Science, Maths, English and Maltese.



Visit from the Mobile Dental Unit

The Mobile Dental Unit offered free check-ups to the students participating in XjenzaMania. In



addition to their dental check-ups, the students were also given a short explanation on how to properly take care of their teeth. The CRC also contacted various summer schools in the Cottonera area to inform them of the availability of this service. The mobile unit provided this service to the general public for three consecutive Fridays in July and August.



Visit from the Insp. Timothy Zammit from the Cyber Crime Unit

Insp. Timothy Zammit was invited to conduct a session on cybercrime on Friday 22nd July. During said session the students learnt about cyber bullying and what precautions can be taken to prevent it. The inspector also spoke about the various risks one can encounter online, and what security measures one should take together and what actions need to be taken to report the case.



EasyPeasy Session

Mr. Klaus Conrad paid a visit to the Centre in order to conduct a programming and robotics session with the students. The classes were divided into three groups. The sessions were also used to showcase the different programmes that can be performed by the same robot.



Visit to Esplora



On the 5th of August the students were taken to Esplora centre, run by the Malta Council of Science and Technology. The students participated in a workshop about bubbles.

Experiments

This year the Cottonera Resource Centre elicited the help of Dr Lourdes Farrugia from the Faculty of Science to include a number of experiments and demonstrations which were held during XjenzaMania on Wednesday every week. Different themes were addressed during the summer and topics included discussions and fun activities on bees, demonstrations and experiments on fire and heat, the solar system and our planet. A session on environmental conservation was included in the programme.



For the session on Bees, a biologist from the Department of Biology, Ms Lucia Farrugia spoke on how important bees were to make honey, beeswax and pollinate plants. The students learnt about the different types of bees found in Malta. They also discussed the environmental impact if bees were to be totally wiped out. The children also participated in a role play to understand the different roles of bees and how they communicate using dances and pheromones.

For the second week Ms Anita Farrugia, a graduate from the Department of Chemistry, performed some interesting and colourful demonstrations. This session included a fun way of explaining different states of matter, followed by the fireproof balloon flame tests to demonstrate the different amount of heat required to pop the balloon when filled with different materials. Following that, colourful flame tests were conducted to demonstrate how different ions in a compound can be identified based on the colour of the flame. The session ended with an exothermic reaction, involving Elephant's toothpaste,





On the third week the demonstrations focused on our planet and the crust structure. Ms Daniela Farrugia, a PhD student from the Department of Geosciences conducted an intriguing explanation of how plate tectonics work using oreo biscuits. She also explained how an earthquake is recorded using seismograms. After installing a seismogram in class, participants were invited to create an 'earthquake' by jumping up and down together to record the different

spikes on the seismograph. They also created their own seismogram and recorded a spike created by a tennis ball. Following that an explanation of primary and secondary waves and how they propagate was given in a very engaging way since participants had to act as particles. Finally, the

students helped replicate a volcanic eruption using bicarbonate of soda and vinegar. Volcanoes were constructed during Design and Technology classes prior to the session.



The following two sessions were dedicated to water. During these sessions participants were involved in messy



involved in messy experiments outdoors. Three scientists from the Department of Physics, namely Mr Julian Bonello, Mr William Hicklin and Ms. Daphne Anne Pollacco, prepared fun sessions for participants

including the upside down water cup, gravel water filter, non-Newtonian fluid. The children also participated in a water purifying experiment which explained how reverse osmosis works, what happens with filtration and how salt is extracted from seawater.

The last session was dedicated to the Solar system and was taken care of by Ms Deandra Cutajar. The students participated in a quiz on all the planets. They also created a solar system using balloons and newspapers. These planets were constructed during Design and Technology classes, prior to lesson. These were mounted on broomsticks for display in each classroom.



Outings

Outings occurred on a Thursday. The idea behind the excursions was to learn by seeing. The students were also taken to a variety of places of interest linked with vocation, culture, history and science.

Excursion 1 – Junior College

For the first excursion (14th July) the students were taken to the Junior College, Msida. They were welcomed by the principal Mr Paul Xuereb, who underlined that the Junior College was a stepping stone that could lead them to go on to the University of Malta. After a short tour of the premises, the students were met by CRC board member Dr. Noel Vella who conducted a number of Chemistry demonstrations for the students in the Junior College lab.



Excursion 2 – Kordin & Marsa Fire station

On the 21st July, Civil Protection invited us to the Marsa Fire Station, where the students were shown the different equipment used by the Marine Section of the Civil Protection. While touring the quarters the students were told about the different accidents that the Search and Rescue Officers have to deal with from fire, car accidents, oil spills and biologically hazardous material. At the Marine and Kordin Fire Station students were shown different equipment, how these were





Excursion 3 – Valletta

On the **28th July**, the students were taken to Valletta where they visited the State Rooms and the Armoury at the Grand Master's Palace. They were also taken to Upper Barakka to enjoy a quick break before heading back to the centre.



Excursion 4 – University of Malta – Faculty of ICT, Engineering, & Institute of Earth Systems.

On the 4th of August, the students were taken to the University of Malta, where they were split into three groups and taken to different workshops organised by the Faculties of ICT and Engineering as well as the Institute of Earth Systems. Classes E & F were welcomed by the Department of Systems and Control Engineering within the Faculty of Engineering where they tried programming and assembled a Mindstorm Robot. At the Faculty of ICT the students



explored some of the possibilities offered by virtual reality. Classes C & D were first taken to the Faculty of ICT and were later received by Dr. Belinda Gambin at the Institute of Earth Systems where they could explore the different components of different types of soil. The younger students were shown the conductive properties of various materials at the Department of Metallurgy and Materials Engineering, right after they visited the Institute of Earth Systems.








Excursion 5 – Buskett

On the 6th August the students were invited to Buskett by Mr. Neville Ebejer from MSDEC Park, and Birdlife Malta. Mr Ebejer spoke about the different trees found in Buskett. They also collected different types of seeds produced by the trees there. Some of these seeds were collected and planted in a small pot which the students took home with them. Once the seedlings grew they were to be taken back to Buskett for the staff there to plant. BirdLife volunteers set the students on a nature trail so that they could learn about the different habitats of reptiles and insects found in Buskett.



Excursion 6 - Malta Life Science Park

On the 18th of August, the students were taken on an outing for the last time during XjenzaMania. They visited the Malta Life Science Park where they were shown over the premises. They were also involved in two games. In one they learnt about the different medicines available, and their characteristics. In the other they learnt how to extract the DNA from bananas. Some of the students were adamant that when they grow up they would find a job in one of the laboratories on site.





Adult courses organized by CRC

Il-Gimgha Mqaddsa

Prof. Peter Mayo, a leading international expert on adult education, organized a short course on the Holy Week. This theme served as a springboard for venturing into different areas of enquiry and knowledge, according to the organizer. Holy Week was used as theme to help capturess the communities' imagination. Political education, with a strong historical foundation, featured prominently in the 'Holy Week' project. One session focused on Imperialism at the time and used this issue to discuss present incidences of colonialism and neo-colonialism. session was on the artistic aspect of Holy Week, led by Fine Arts Museum Curator. The session by Dr Marco Galea on theatre was followed by Mons Alfred Vella on Spirituality, Ms Anna Spiteri focused on environmental issues in Holy Week, while Prof. Anthony Bonanno led a discussion on Roman imperialism. Ms Nathalie Grima looked at the role of Women/gender in Holdy Week. Eric Montfort and Dr Albert Bell dealt with music (solemn music, marches and rock) and Michael Grech discussed Pier Paolo Pasolini's Vangelo Secondo Matteo and compared it with Mel Gibson's Passion of the Christ). All the sessions generated much discussion. The intention was for both session leader and participants to move 'from the known to the unknown' according to Prof Mayo. Prof Mayo turned this communal expression and manifestation of the 'popular creative spirit' into an educational event.

The CRC also organized a public lecture on social housing. Dr. Kurt Scerri conducted this public lecture that was held at the Cottonera Resource Centre on the 6th April, 2016. During the lecture, Dr. Scerri went over the Maltese Legislation that controls renting of residential properties, rights and obligations of tenants. The CRC team felt that this issue needed to be discussed since the majority of the clients who visited the Legal Clinic were concerned about the rising rents in the area. This issue was also brought up with a number of ministers who visited the Forum Kommita' Bormliza.

Kids on Campus

Once again this year the University of Malta sponsored 4 primary students from St. Margaret College to attend Kids on Campus. The objective of this exercise is to help children from the Cottonera area develop new friendships outside the area. CRC liaises with the Head of Schools who in turn, nominates the students. This year four students between the ages of 5 and 6 years benefitted from this opportunity. On the 20th of June a meeting was held at the Cottonera Resource Centre, where the Director of Kids on Campus, Ms. Dragana Gnjatovic, the Principal of St. Margaret and the Director of the CRC addressed the parents of the nominated students. Ms Gnjatovic gave some information about the programme while CRC staff coordinated transport arrangements.

After the programme Ms. Gnjatovic informed the centre that the students integrated very well within their classes and had a very positive experience. She however pointed out that of the four nominated students, only three had attended the summer school. This occurred because the parent felt that the student had to wake up too early to be able to attend Kids on Campus. The parents of the students who had attended Kids On Campus were also approached. These all had positive comments for the programme. The project was a success with most of the nominated students thoroughly enjoying their experience with some even expressing a desire to return for the summer school next year.

• Prima Klassi

LEAP Xlokk together with St. Margaret's College organised the project Prima Klassi. The course that was run during the academic year 2015-2016 was hosted at the Cottonera Resource Centre. The aim of the course was to motivate those who attended to reintegrate in the labour market. The sessions were held every Friday morning, with the session being split into two parts. During the first part, Ms. Butters, a retired English teacher would conduct an English session. In the second part the lesson focused on computer literacy, self-development, home management and employability skills.

Community engagement and outreach

To be able to operate in the Cottonera and Kalkara area, the CRC needs to be in constant touch with what is going on. To do so, CRC representatives attend a number of meetings and participate in activities held in the area.

Meetings are held with different stakeholders for a number of purposes:

- 1. To find out what different entities, groups or individuals within the community need
- 2. To find out what services other entities within the community or beyond are offering
- 3. To inform entities, groups and individuals of the services or courses offered at the CRC

- 4. To advocate for policy or administrative changes when CRC team becomes aware that certain groups within the communities found in Cottonera and Kalkara area are being short-changed. In fact, this year we worked on two issues, namely facilitating the entry into of non-traditional students at tertiary level. For this issue, various persons were approached at University to ask them to create courses which are of interest to people from the area. Others were approached to explore ways of helping non-traditional students accrue a diploma/degree over time and incrementally by attending different short courses offered by UoM. We also explored alternative methods of assessment for this type of student. Furthermore, as underlined before we also adopted an advocacy role when we raised awareness about the problems caused by rising rents in the housing private sector in the area. This issue was discussed with various ministers, NGOs as well as the media. Eventually it was taken on board by a number of NGOs.
- 5. Explore the potential through the President's Trust of creating and implementing various community projects in other areas of Malta.

Promotion of CRC services and courses

The services and courses offered by the CRC have to be constantly promoted to ensure that the public know about them. A multi-method approach is adopted. Personnel go to promote these on radio and TV programmes, or write an article which is then publish on NOC or local

Visits by foreign universities

Visitors from Kingston University paid a visit to the CRC on 16th May 2016 led by Prof Annie Hughes. Before the visit Prof Hughes was taken to meet administrators at UoM so that she could discuss which measures Kingston University adopts to attract students from certain non-traditional groups and ensure that they remain and do well at university level.

EU COST Training School Appearance Matters

The Gender Studies Department, within the University of Malta, approached the Cottonera Resource Centre in order to host the EU COST Training School Appearance Matters between the 9th and the 11th of November 2015. During the three day workshop, the participants explored appearance dissatisfaction in marginalised and socially disadvantaged groups.

The organisation of the event was split between the CRC and the Gender Studies Department, with the Centre taking care of logistics regarding to transport, food, WIFI, accommodation and room allocation. There were around twenty participants, excluding the visiting speakers, coming from various countries in Europe. The money accrued was used to buy educational resources.





Train the Trainers Workshop on Themes from Grease

In a meeting organized by Dr Susan Ross, the cultural attaché at the US Embassy held on the 26th February, it was decided that a number of workshops should be organized by Astra Productions, Gender Studies Department and CRC on gender role training with youth leaders. The first meeting was held on April 15th, 2016 where Mr. Christopher Gatt, director of Grease musical at the Astra Theatre conducted the first workshop. The next session which took place in May was led by Dr Brenda Murphy. Two sessions were held at the CRC to teach youth workers how to use Grease to discuss issues concerning sexuality, relationships and media portrayal.

Use of funds

During 2015-2016 the Cottonera Resource Centre invested in a number of resources to enable it to ameliorate the quality of the services provided. The Centre invested in a pull-up banner used during activities outside the centre including CRC promotion, community outreach, etc.

In addition LEGO WeDo V2 Robotic Kits were purchased with the objective of exposing young participants to robotics and programming. A computer lab was also set up. Here the University's Capital Funds were used to purchase the necessary hardware. CRC in turn paid for the Microsoft Office license which were installed onto the computers together with Minecraft and Scratch 2.

Maintenance and cleaning services

During the academic year 2015/2016 some maintenance work were performed at the Cottonera Resource Centre. The major project was the setting of the computer lab in Room 1. This was built in collaboration with the IT and electricity division. Estate & Works department were also involved. The project was finalised in July 2016.

When the Centre lost its permeant cleaning staff in August 2015, a cleaner was sent to conduct cleaning duties twice a week for two hours. During the summer, three cleaners visited the centre every day for two hours in order to maintain the cleaning standards required for the smooth running of the project.

Research and presentation

Two papers were prepared for V18 publications by the director. The director took part in the Cultural Mapping Conference which took place on the 22nd-23rd of October 2015, Mediterranean Conference Centre to present a poster about the methodology used in this research. On the first day she gave a poster presentation on the 22nd October and acted as rapporteur and moderator on the second day of said conference. On the 15th of April 2016 the video and book on Cultural Mapping was launched at the Auberge d'Italie, Valletta. The second paper still has to be published.

The director was also approached by L-Ghaqda Veterani Laburista to give a speech on what can lead to poverty when people become pensioners, and how poverty can affect the elderly physically, mentally and socially. The presentation took place during a seminar entitled *Il-Faqar u l-Anzjani* which was held at the Labour Party Headquarters.

The CRC director also conducted informal research women in STEM at university level. A number of meetings and seminars took place to find out means of increasing more women in these areas. These meetings took place on the 4th and 5th February, 1st and 14th March, 18th April, as well as on the 6th and 24th of May.

A number of meetings took place at the Faculty for Social Wellbeing to decide on a topic and methodology for a project which can be undertaken by the different entities within this faculty. The director was involved in choosing a locality, project and methodology. A number of meetings for this project took place on 6th and 25th January, 17th February, 9th March, 27th April, 4th and 23rd May, and 12th July.

Collaboration with International Scholars

- Prof Mary Durfee from Michigan Tech who provides CRC with Pavlov students every year
- Prof Susan Hirsch from the School for Conflict Analysis and Resolution at George Mason University who is interested in how the public learns about their civic rights.
- Prof Annie Hughes, Kingston University who works in the Equality, Diversity and Inclusion Directorate in Kingston to promote a more inclusive framework.
- Prof Paul Downes who advises the CRC on how to turn this centre into a centre of excellence for lifewide learning.

EPALE Awards

CRC applied for an EPALE (European Platform for Adult Learning) Award under Community Learning Initiative category in August 2016. This award was organized by the Directorate for Lifelong Learning. The aim of this initiative is to give visibility to best practices in adult education and training in Malta. This award was short listed by the evaluation board and subsequently the director had to participate in another evaluation session during Presentation Day which took place on the 2nd of September at Le Meridien St. Julian's.

Reports

The CRC has to showcase its projects in a number of reports written by state entities to be presented at EU level. These consisted of the Lifelong Learning Strategy - Progress Report. CRC contribution was submitted on the 25th of March 2016. Another report was forwarded to the Ministry for Education and Employment's Framework for the Education Strategy for Malta 2014-2024 on the 5th of October 2015.
