AMENDMENT - TYPE 1

Change in the Consortium Composition

- Changes in partner circumstances
- Disagreements amongst partners
- Misunderstanding on what RISE is about

Explain amendment proces at Kick-off meeting or add a clause in the Consortium and Partnership Agreement



AMENDMENT – TYPE 2

Changes in Planned Secondments

- Staff movement in institutions
- Personal circumstances (health, work obligations)
- Changes in consortium composition

Keep List of Secondments always up to date and inform your project officer of any change



PROCESS

How was the amendment carried out?

- through the local administration
- Consortium Changes: immediate
- Secondment Changes: batched
- Gathering of information: mostly myself (COO)
- Limited information on what needs to be gathered

OUTCOME

Was the amendment approved?

- draft version was checked by project officer

- First time we had to withdraw and correct
- Second time the amendment has been approved



LESSONS LEARNT

- It takes longer than planned
- Gathering of information is not always straighforward
- Partners leaving the consortium are not necessarily cooperative
- By the time you gather all the inputs, some information may become outdated
- Once everything is in place, approval is fast



ENHANCEMENT PROPOSED

- System seems to be designed for static information, but our experience showed that this needs to change often.
- More detailed instructions on how to go about it and perhaps a compiled lists of FAQs.
- Less reliance on proprietary software and allow for Open Standard alternatives.
